

Many Sentences Suspended.
 Ruth Jackson was sentenced to serve four years in the penitentiary yesterday by Justice Siddons in Criminal Court No. 1, and Charles Lee sentenced to three years for the robbery of \$395 from Allen Coibert on October 5 last.

RETAIL STORES CLOSE ALL DAY TOMORROW

The most extensive holiday program ever attempted by the business houses of Washington will be begun tomorrow, according to announcement by Secretary Charles J. Columbus of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association.

Practically all of the large retail establishments also will begin the all-day closing Saturday, which will continue through July and August. "This full day's holiday has been voluntarily extended as an appreciation of the splendid service that has been rendered by the store employees," said Mr. Columbus. "and to enable them to better prepare for the tremendous volume of business that is anticipated for the fall and winter."

The all-day Saturday closing was inaugurated in Washington three years ago by several of the large houses. This year about ten times as many stores are doing so.

Chance for Yanks to Get Civil Service Jobs

United States soldiers, sailors and Marines who missed opportunity to enter civil service examinations because of their absence overseas may be given a chance to qualify for government employment under an opinion of the Attorney General rendered yesterday to the Civil Service Commission.

An act of Congress approved March 2, 1915, provides "That hereafter in making appointments to clerical and other positions in the executive departments and independent governmental establishments preference shall be given to honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and Marines, and widows of such, if they are qualified to hold such positions."

Wants to Raise Clerks' Salaries.
 Representative Nolan has introduced in Congress a bill providing for a general increase in salaries in the patent office, and to provide funds for certain specified activities of the patent office. The proposed salary increases are given in the bill.

FINES FLIER WHO LANDS IN PARK

Judge Penalizes Aviator Who Couldn't See "Keep Off the Grass" Signs.

New York, July 2.—New York either will have to build its "Keep Off the Grass" signs large enough for an aviator aloft to read them, or else build its grass plots nearer the sky.

Philip A. Bjarklund, an aviator, of 510 West 124th street, Manhattan, in flying over the city, suddenly had to decide whether or not he would mow up the grass in Van Cortlandt Park or mow up himself in landing on the roof of some tall building nearby.

He chose the former, and also landed in court on a charge of trespassing. Bjarklund's engine began to miss fire soon after he had taken the air at Sheepshead Bay for a trip to Albany.

He looked below when the engine trouble first developed, but could see nothing but rows of apartment houses and narrow streets. Then he spied a nice long open stretch of lawn. The nearer he got to the lawn the worse his engine trouble became and he landed on that spot. Since his life was in danger, Bjarklund preferred to violate the law first and then argue about it afterward.

Bjarklund, who is a civilian flier with twenty-one months' service in the army to his credit, told Magistrate Robert E. Ten Eyck when arraigned that the question whether or not he would be violating the law in landing on the grass was too complicated for him to decide when his engine trouble reached the point that something must be done and done quickly.

There were quite a number of people in the park at the time, Policeman John T. Shields, who arrested Bjarklund, testified, but none were injured.

"I couldn't see the sign," Bjarklund told Magistrate Ten Eyck. "Furthermore," he stated, "I had only a couple of seconds to decide what to do and I did it. The next time, I will probably tie up to a church steeple."

Magistrate Ten Eyck found him guilty and suspended sentence.
