IS INSPECTED

Health Department Condemns 600 Pounds of Fish and Other Edibles.

The pure food and milk drive being conducted by the local health department, under the direction of Dr. William C. Fowler, caused the inspection and condemnation of 600 pounds of mixed fish, 8 crates of eggplants, 5 hampers of cucumbers, 55 pounds of smoked meats, 1 barrel of sauer kraut, 5 crates of peaches, 2 barrels of lettuce, 196 pounds of chicken, 55 pounds of lard and 2 boxes of cream cheese. The above inspections are included in the report of the health department for the week ended July 5.

In places where food of any kind was sold or stored, 174 inspections took place. One hundred and thirty-seven barber shops and thirty-three laundries were also subject to inspection. The report states:

Three farms were inspected in the District, twenty-five in Maryland and twenty-two in Virginia. The examination of 632 cattle took place at the farms.

Thirteen permits to bring or send milk into the District for sale were granted, and five were canceled, according to the report.

ARMY AND NAVY

Enlistment for Service in Alaska.
Recruiting officers at all recruiting stations and at posts, camps and stations at which recruiting offices are established were authorized by the War Department on June 19, to accept for enlistment and enlist men in the infantry for service in Alaska. Such enlistments will be for a period of three years. Upon enlistment men enlisted for service in Alaska will be sent with the least practicable delay by their respective commanding officers to Vancouver Barracks, Wash., for assignment to the Twenty-first Infantry.

Returns of Civilian Workers.
Undersecretary of State Polk said on June 27, in an interview, that Secretary of War Baker had advised the State Department that approximately 18,000 first-class accommodations would be needed by the War Department before November 1 to be used for the transportation of civilian workers to this country. This would largely be for welfare workers, Mr. Polk said. The Undersecretary added that this requirement was larger than it would be possible for the shipping facilities to meet.

50,000 Travel Pay Claims Paid.
The zone finance officer has paid to date nearly 50,000 claims for additional travel pay at the rate of 1 1/2 cents per mile from place of discharge to place of entering the service. Applications for this additional pay, provided for by the act of Congress approved February 28, 1918, are being received at the rate of 800 to 1,500 a day. They are being paid as rapidly as they are received in the office. The average payment on the claims for back travel pay is approximately \$7.

Officers in Class 3 by Grades.
According to a statement of the personnel branch of the general staff, there were on June 26 15,615 officers in Class 3, those who desire commissions in the regular army. The grades in which this great reserve of officer material are divided follows: Colonels, 11; lieutenant colonels, 137; majors, 1,325; captains, 3,656; first lieutenants, 4,836; second lieutenants, 5,647. The statistics have not been issued as to the percentage of these officers in the arms, departments or corps of the service.

BEQUEATHS \$25,000 TO GERMAN RELATIVES

New York, July 12.—Widows and orphans and soldiers from Mayen, in the Coblenz district of Germany, were bequeathed approximately \$25,000 in the will of Miss Kathi Paffon, filed in the Surrogate's Court here today. After detailing several bequests, including one to a step-brother, in Coblenz, the will said:

"All the rest and residue of my estate I give and bequeath to the City of Mayen, Coblenz, Germany, to be used by said city for the relief of widows and orphans residing in Mayen whose husbands or fathers have been killed in the recent war."

SACCHARINE USERS TO FEEL LAW'S HAND

Investigation of charges that local manufacturers of sodas and soft drinks are using saccharine in the manufacture of their products has been ordered by Dr. William C. Fowler, District health officer. The use of saccharine is a violation of existing health regulations. Fowler declares that he intends dealing severely with persons breaking the laws. The use of the sugar substitute is dangerous to the health of the consumer, especially children, it is said.

Sugar Cane Crop Short Sixteen Thousand Acres

The acreage of the sugar cane crop in the United States this year will be 595,000 acres, the Department of Agriculture has announced. This is a decrease of 16,000, as compared with the 527,000 acres planted in 1918.

Louisiana is leading all States with a total of 254,000 acres as compared with 303,000 last year.

Canadian Strikers Drop To Lower Wage Demands

Ottawa, Ont., July 12.—The street railway company here is steadfastly refusing to make any concession in the strike of car employees. Fifty per cent service has been in operation by strike-breakers. Men who struck, it is said, have reduced their demands for a wage increase from 50 cents to 50 cents.


