Approached on the subject of Wood's murder, Starr emphatically disclaimed all knowledge of the crime. Starr, according to the report, objected strenuously when he was searched by the Cincinnati night detective chief, Emmett Kirgan. The detective found \$300 on the prisoner. Starr is purported to have threatened Kirgan following the search with the words: "When I get out of this I will come back and knock your block off."

Youth, Murdered in Basement, Lived a Lonely Life in City

A lonely life with a tragic end—such was the Washington career of young Emmett H. Wood, victim of a mysterious murder.

Attracted by the glamour and romance that about the Capital by word and deed, Wood left his home in Charlottesville, Va., and came here late in July.

Quiet and reserved in manner, imbued with the enthusiasm of youth and eager to make his mark, Wood, in his life, the young Virginian arrived. He had traveled light, without even a suitcase, bringing with him a small sum of money and the clothes he wore.

Wood went to the home of Leonard N. Rooting, formerly of Charlottesville, but now living at 401 M street northeast. The Rooting family saw little of him.

The first days in Washington were spent in admiring the wonders of the city. Then came a long, weary search for a job. Finally, a month ago, Wood obtained a position as soda fountain clerk at the Lizzadro drug store, 134 F street northwest.

Wood's personality was one which permitted the making of friends, and he was popular. The employees at the Lizzadro store were fond of the boy, but without those acquaintances whom he had met in the line of business, Wood was alone.

The long, weary summer days, devoted most by the soda fountain clerks, dragged along for almost a month. Then Wood changed his place of living to a rooming house at 27 Seventh street northwest.

Suddenly, on a clear Friday morning, the boy was found dead, murdered in the dark basement of the Western Building.

Starr's Wife Admits Husband Introduced Her to Young Woods

"I believe that Henry is innocent of the Wood murder," declared the pretty wife of ex-Policeman Henry Starr, at her home, 41 Grant place, yesterday. Starr had another woman with him in Cincinnati.

"But then, I never believed he would desert his baby and me for another woman, leaving us with only six cents and a few cents in his pocket. He was so sensitive about blood or anything of that nature, and I cannot possibly conceive of his doing anything brutal and there was no motive for him to kill Woods. When he left, he had over \$500, so I do not think he would need to rob anyone of \$50.

"During his trouble last July with the police force," said Mrs. Starr, "I stuck by him and fought for him, and never for a moment had any idea that he would let any other woman come between us. The morning he left, he kissed me and fondled the baby as usual. We never quarreled and did not have any domestic troubles whatsoever.

Always Seemed Devoted. "Henry always was a devoted husband and spent all of his time with baby and me, and I cannot understand when he became infatuated with this other woman.

"Some time ago there was a girl-an actress—who had known Henry before we were married, and she tried then to make things unpleasant for us, but Henry refused to have anything to do with her.

"I shall never go back to him—never shall forgive him—and I will work to raise my little baby to forget what her father had done to besmirch her innocent name."

Mrs. Starr has suffered so greatly from the shock of her husband's desertion that she is under a physician's care and is confined to her bed. Necessity requires her to seek employment, and she will begin work in a public office to support her infant daughter and keep her little home intact.

Mrs. Starr is Pretty. "She is a very pretty young woman, in her early 30's, and a very devoted wife and mother. Her only thoughts at this dark moment are not of her own future, but of her baby. When she has saved enough money, she intends to move to the country, where her misfortune will be forgotten and her baby grow in innocence of her father's sin."

"Henry introduced me to Wood one night, but that is the only time that I have seen him. He seemed to be a nice, clean-looking boy, but I do not believe that Henry knew him very well.

"When the detectives return to Washington with my husband and the other woman, I shall go down to see her. If I identify her as the New actress, I shall tell all that I know about her. She was stopping at the Belmont Hotel, in Atlantic City, when I saw her. I was there on my way to the city and I told her that I had seen her in Cincinnati. She said she had been acquainted with him before our marriage."

Long Hours and Small Pay Rule in Far Off China. Shanghai.—American labor unions are in many cases dissatisfied with the eight-hour day, and would reduce the hours of labor to six. China has no fixed number of hours to work, except in the case of certain individual factories and firms. With some of the latter the twelve-hour day prevails while with a smaller proportion the eight-hour day has become the custom.

In the shops, however, the hours are just as long as the proprietor wants to keep open. The apprentices, youths who in America would still be in the grammar school or the first year of two in high school, are the ones who suffer most from this. Their work time varies anywhere from twelve to nineteen hours. Most of the shops keep open at least sixteen hours.

It is estimated that in the shops of the foreign settlement alone in Shanghai there are more than 20,000 boy apprentices. Their pay is small, or nothing at all, though they do receive rice and lodging where they work.
