Mrs. Bessie Gleason Tells Court Louis Randall Was the Man.

### TROUBLE PICKING JURY

Eighteen Veniremen Rejected Before Panel Is Selected.

The dramatic recital of a heroic struggle for life was heard by the jury trying the case of Louis Randall, charged with assault, in Criminal Court No. 2, before Justice Stafford yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. Bessie Gleason, victim of a brutal assault on the night of June 26, last, in Ray's Woods, near Takoma Park, describes how her assailant struck her repeatedly and kicked her until she lost consciousness.

### TAKOMA SCHOOL MARRED BY MUSHROOM PORTABLES

Growing Neighborhood, With Hundreds of Children Denied Educational Facilities, Demands Attention.

Takoma School is another of the public educational institutions which has suffered on account of the war. An appropriation for an addition was not found sufficient when the time came to build, and now efforts are being made to hurry along the money so that more than a hundred little children will not have to obtain their education in portable and other structures away from the main building.

This school is located at Takoma Park, not long ago considered one of the suburban cities, but its phenomenal growth in the past few years now obtains for it a consideration as an integral part of the town. It has grown by leaps and bounds, and will continue to grow. Walking along many of its streets and watching the many building operations going on makes one wonder where the children who certainly will be in most of these houses are going to receive their education.

Huts for Students. The present building is an impressive one, but its appearance is somewhat marred by the two portables which it has been found necessary to construct in order to take care of the increase in the number of children. Another one now is in course of construction, and efforts are being made to have it completed before the jam comes as a result of the February promotions.

Proposed when the new building goes up to give two rooms to manual training—a modern manual training school with power lathes and other power wood working appliances. Children now go to the Brightwood School for this instruction.

Deprived of Play Room. In order to give the girls in the school sewing and cooking lessons the girls' playroom space in the basement has been taken away from them. The girls' playroom, which has no playroom space, or a place to spend their recess periods in bad weather. The basement room originally intended for this purpose is now full of material of various kinds, and in various conditions of disorder.

The school now has in attendance 713 children in thirteen classes with fourteen teachers, the additional teacher being an assistant in the kindergarten. Five of the classes have more than forty-five children in them, and a few of them run as high as fifty.

Starting with four rooms in 1899, the main building now has eight rooms, the addition being put up in 1903. In the first four years it was found necessary to double the size of the school, but in the past six years no provision has been made for the increased number of children except the addition of portables and the rented building.

The children in this school, which, by law, is supposed to go a whole day, is compelled by the crowded conditions to take a half day session. While the condition of overcrowding has been relieved to some extent by the present arrangement, nevertheless there is a fear that the February promotions will cause difficulties which may involve sending the surplus children many blocks further to school than they should be going.

### "KICK" IN CIDER TO CAUSE SUIT


Dealers in Apple Juice Will Be Prosecuted Under Some Law.
