

SLAYER MEETS DEATH CALMLY

James Henry Jackson, Murderer of Lillian Hood, Pays Supreme Penalty.

WARNING TO COUSIN Tells Him to Follow "Older Heads' Advice" in Life.

Bidding cheerful farewell to six other condemned men at the District Jail, James Henry Jackson, murderer of Miss Lillian Hood, a young war worker, yesterday morning went calmly to his death on the gallows in the northeastern corridor of the District Jail.

Except for his roving glances to avoid the gallows as he moved down the death house corridor, Jackson was unmoved to the last.

Kisses Crucifix. Before the noose was adjusted and the black cap placed over his head and face, the condemned man held to his lips a crucifix handed to him by the Rev. Father Andrew H. Mihm, of St. Augustine's Church, whose counsel in Jackson's last hours is credited with having enabled him to face death calmly.

It was the quickest execution in the history of the jail. The trap was sprung at 7:01 o'clock, just one minute and thirty seconds after Jackson left his cell. He was pronounced dead at 7:14 o'clock by Dr. James A. Gannon and Dr. J. M. Ladd, attending physicians.

In a lonely spot in Mt. Olivet cemetery, with the Rev. Father Mihm performing the last rites, Jackson was buried at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

His sister and divorced wife had visited him in his cell the day before.

Scorned All Advice. Another visitor was Ogie Jackson, a cousin, an inmate of the cell to whom the condemned man remarked: "If I had listened to older heads I wouldn't be here now."

Jackson received his communion at a mass from 4:30 to 5 o'clock in the morning in an altar erected especially for him in one of the prison rooms. Following this he ate a meal, ordered by himself a week ago, one of the privileges accorded men to be executed. It consisted of a large steak with onions, wheat cakes, rolls and coffee.

Father Mihm remained with the prisoner all night.

Superintendent Charles S. Foster had charge of the hanging. Capt. W. L. Peake, assistant superintendent, gave the signal for springing the trap by dropping a handkerchief on the platform. It was the first execution witnessed by Capt. Peake in his ten years of prison work.


3,000 DuPont Employees Provided Food at Cost

Wilmington, Del., March 2.—The DuPont Company, of this city, will reduce the high cost of living for its many employees by selling food products at cost by the company, which has more than 3,000 employees here and will handle considerable stock, officials believe they can effect considerable saving.

BELLHOP CONVICTED OF JEWELRY THEFT

Calvin L. Savage, former bellboy in a local hotel, pleaded guilty to a charge of grand larceny involving \$11,000 worth of jewelry yesterday morning before Chief Justice McCoy in Criminal Court. He was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

Savage, who took employment at the hotel under the name of Henry O'Connor, robbed the room of Mrs. Mary J. Hayner, and fled to California. Detective Springman traced Savage to Los Angeles, and brought him back to the city, where he was arrested together with about \$11,000 worth of the jewels. The theft was committed October 28, 1918.

Sues for \$10,000 Damages Due to Motor Accident

John Tier, a former employe of the Union Transfer Company, filed suit for \$10,000 damages against the company yesterday in the District Supreme Court, alleging severe personal injuries when he was struck by a motor truck. The accident is alleged to have happened August 25, 1918. Tier is represented by Attorneys King, Simon, Young and Koenigsberger.

Burdine was awarded a verdict of \$150 and costs against the Washington Railway and Electric Company yesterday by a jury before Justice Hitz in District Supreme Court for injuries alleged to have been received in a collision on the Takoma Park line. The accident happened in July, 1918, near Piney Branch road.

219 Building Permits Issued.

Permits to erect 219 new buildings in the District, ranging from apartments to garages, were issued during the month of February. It was shown yesterday in the monthly report on building operations of the inspector of buildings. Financial transactions involved amounted to \$1,537,112.

Baker Declares Army Plan Not Militaristic
