JENNINGS LEFT TWO MILLIONS

Mining Engineer's Will Bequeaths Most of Estate To Relatives.

\$25,000 TO CHARITY

Associated Charities, St. John's Church and Children's Hospital Benefitted.

Hennen Jennings, mining engineer, who died March 5, left an estate valued at approximately \$2,000,000, according to his will, filed for probate yesterday. The will, which is dated November 11, 1919, makes cash bequests to relatives, friends and grandchildren, totaling \$307,500.

A sister, Miss Edith O. Jennings, is given \$40,000. Another sister, Mrs. Kate C. Parish, living in England, is left only \$1,000.

Relatives Bequeathed Sums.

A brother-in-law, James Legendre, of New Orleans, is willed \$20,000. Two aunts, Mary Broadwood, of Rome, Italy, and Eva Harding, are each given \$5,000. A cousin, Octavia Robinson, is willed \$3,000. Lizzie Carruthers, Caddie Hodding and Anne Carter, cousins of the deceased, are each given \$3,000.

The grandchildren, John M. Jennings, James H. Legendre, Mabel Perkins, James H. Blanton, Hermine Eckstein and Alice A. Belt, are each willed \$1,000. An old family servant, Alfred Peters, of London, also is given \$1,000. Lawyers' fees and back is to have \$1,400 and Ellen Mabley \$500.

Children's Hospital Aided.

The deceased's employees are each to have \$100 for each year of service and a bonus of \$100. The Associated Charities is given \$10,000, St. John's Church and the Children's Hospital \$5,000 each, and a like amount to the Hawesville, Ky., Cemetery. A daughter, Mrs. Katherine J. Hackett, and her husband, Chauncey Hackett, are given the premises at 1825 Twenty-fourth street northwest, with the furniture. A trust fund of \$50,000 is created also for the benefit of the daughter and son-in-law. Another trust fund of \$50,000 is created for the benefit of their two children.

A son, Coleman Jennings, is willed \$25,000. The residue of the estate is willed absolutely to the widow, Mrs. Mary Lucretia Jennings, who with the son and Richard W. Hynson, are named executors.

Government Should Stop Ship Building, Says Payne

At his "swan song" conference to newspapermen yesterday afternoon in the capacity of chairman of the United States Shipping Board, Judge John Barton Payne reiterated the opinion that the government should stop building ships. Monday, Judge Payne stated, he will take the oath of office as Secretary of the Interior.

The advent of Admiral W. S. Benson, Payne's successor to the Shipping Board chairmanship, presages no change of the board's attitude that no new construction program should be attempted. Payne stated that "private agencies can now build ships better than the government."
