**TO THE REPUBLICAN VOTERS  
OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA**

Friends and Fellow-Republicans:

In view of the fact that a hand-picked and self-constituted governing committee in the District of Columbia, with the approval of the Republican National Committee of the said District, has authorized, ordered and directed an autocratic selection, instead of a Republican election, of two delegates and two alternates from the said District to the next Republican National Convention, without having previously issued a public call to the duly qualified Republican voters of the District of Columbia, although the Republican National Committee has promised time and again, publicly and privately, that a public election should be held; and, in further view of the fact that an unrecognized, dissolved and non-existent Republican Central Committee of the District of Columbia since 1892 has, without lawful warrant or authority, from the Republican National Committee, authorized, directed and selected two delegates and two alternates from the said District to the next Republican National Convention, therefore, we, the City Employees' Association, the Robert I. Miller Soldiers and Sailors' Association, the League of Republican Citizens of the District of Columbia, the Republican Inter-State League, incorporated, and the Blaine Inevitable Republican Club, do hereby constitute, appoint and empower an Emergency Election Board of three: namely, Captain J. Walter Mitchell, Attorney Louis S. Gottlieb and Attorney H. A. Clarke, to direct, supervise and control the election of two delegates and two alternates from the District of Columbia to the Republican National Convention to be convened in the City of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois, Tuesday, June 8, 1920; and we, the undersigned, do hereby authorize, empower and direct the said Election Board to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations for holding and governing the said election, in pursuance of the official call of the Republican National Committee.

**THE OFFICIAL CALL OF THE REPUBLICAN NATIONAL COMMITTEE**  
Under date of December 10, 1919, providing for the election of Delegates and Alternates by the Voters.  
"The voters of the . . . District of Columbia who are in accord with the principles of the Republican party, believe in its declaration of policies, and are in sympathy with its aims and purposes, are cordially invited to unite under this call in the selection of delegates to said convention." (Page 1, paragraph 2.)  
"Said National Convention shall . . . consist of . . . two delegates from the District of Columbia." (Page 1, paragraph 3.)  
"Alternate delegates shall be elected to said National Convention for each unit of representation equal in number to the number of delegates elected therein." (Page 1, paragraph 9.)  
"The election of delegates and alternates from . . . the District of Columbia shall be held under the direction of the respective recognized Republican Central Committee, or governing committee therein." (Page 2, paragraph 2.)  
"The credentials of each delegate and alternate elected . . ." (Page 2, paragraph 4.)  
**THE OFFICIAL CALL OF THE ELECTION BOARD FOR HOLDING AN ELECTION FOR TWO DELEGATES AND TWO ALTERNATES IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.**  
We, the undersigned, by virtue of the authority vested in us, and in pursuance of the requirements of the official call of the Republican National Committee, which contemplates the election and not the selection of delegates and alternates to the Republican National Convention, from all parts of the United States, the District of Columbia not excepted, to be convened in the City of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois, Tuesday, June 8, 1920, do hereby adopt and promulgate the following rules and regulations for holding and governing the aforesaid election in the District of Columbia:  
1. That the election of delegates and alternates to the next Republican National Convention shall be held on Saturday, the 8th day of May, 1920.  
2. That the polls shall be kept open in each election precinct or district from 7 o'clock a. m. until 7 o'clock p. m.  
3. That there shall be twenty-six (26) polling places; namely, one in each of the twenty old legislative districts, numbered from 3 to 22, both inclusive, and three each in the first and second old legislative districts. THE POLLING PLACES SHALL BE HEREAFTER DESIGNATED.  
4. That every male resident of the District of Columbia, 21 years of age or over, who is in accord with the principles of the Republican party, believes in its declarations of policies, and is in sympathy with
