

WOMEN WON'T WEAR PATCHES

Spinners in City Club Decide Against Idea as Unsuitable.

CONGRESS SCORED, TOO

Failure to Reduce H. C. L. By Lawmakers Brings Forth Resolution.

This decision was registered as the almost universal decision of the Women's City Club at the annual business meeting last night when Mrs. Rose Gouverneur Hoce, president of the Housekeepers' Alliance, made an eloquent plea for the wearing of patched clothes by members of the club as an example of economy.

Resolution is Tabled. At the end of her address Mrs. Hoce put her proposition in the form of a resolution that members of the club would wear patched clothes.

Without a dissenting vote the club decided to turn over to the club-house at 22 Jackson place to a celebration by a number of women's organizations on May 13 in honor of the 75th birthday of Mrs. Ellen Spencer Mussey, dean of the Washington College of Law.

BACKS EFFORT FOR D. C. VOTE

Author of District Suffrage Bill Talks to City Club.

URGE REPRESENTATION

Burroughs Says Measure Would Be Helpful to Congress.

Declaring that the District of Columbia should have at least two Representatives and two Senators in Congress, Representative Burroughs, of New Hampshire, speaking at the luncheon forum of the City Club yesterday, said he believed that national representation was for the best interests of Washington from both a theoretical and business standpoint.

Burroughs, who is the author of the District suffrage bill, asserted that ambassadors coming here from all the countries of the globe, find, not a spirit of democracy, but the 'only example of a complete despotism in the western hemisphere.'

Referring to the District appropriation bill increasing taxes, Burroughs said, 'your property rights are in jeopardy, and you cannot even whisper. Members of Congress have all they can do to look after their own constituents and if they have a few spare moments they might look after the District, and might not,' he said.

Would Relieve Congress. District representation would take a load off the shoulders of

Congress, and would be a good thing for the District and a good thing for the country, he thought. Burroughs said his bill did not change the existing form of local government, but it puts the citizens of the District on the same status with citizens of the States and gives them the right to sue and be sued in the Federal courts.

Beautiful Nurse, Lately Here, an Imposter, Says Her Countryman.

During 1917, the princess says, she was confined to a base hospital for six months as the result of injury she sustained when a 'Zep' dropped a bomb near where she was dressing the wounds of a Russian officer. For her heroism on this occasion, she says the czar bestowed the first degree Cross of St. George on her.

Those who met the self-styled princess while she was here said she amply justified her nonrecognition of the Russian Red Cross during the war, the American Red Cross failed to accord her any official recognition during her stay in Washington.
