

GRIFFS' TRIBE EASILY WINS, SETTING BACK JENNINGS' TIGERS IN FIVE-INNING NATIONALS IN Serious Slump As Week's Statistics Show

Jungleers Hurlers Pounded, Griff's Winning Short Battle

Detroit, Mich., June 20.—Having been battered from pillar to post by three Western teams during their absence from home, the Griff's untold at the stadium, turning form today against the Washington team in steady rain, the Washingtonians put on a rare exhibition of fancy, long-distance hitting, having a margin of 10 to 4 when the game was called in the sixth, two late for the 15,000 to get rain checks.

Two Home Runs. Bobby Roth initiated the batting line when he drove the ball over the left field wall in the first inning, and Sam Rice annexed the other circuit push by hitting to deep center in the fifth, after which Milton had tapped a mere triple to left.

In the sixth Jim Shaw put on a Babe Ruth stunt when he swatted the longest drive of the day over the barrier. It struck in the middle of the street and bounded through a plate glass window of a residence on the other side.

Joe Judge made a clean steal of home in the first round, catching the Tiger infield asleep after Rice had rounded out to Ellison. Pitcher Okrie held the ball and pointed what to do with it. At last he decided to throw to third, but found that the base was not covered.

Shaw worked the entire five rounds for the Nationals and, profiting by the runs batted in by the Griff's, worked a grand slam, which was a visitor in the press box, but refused to express an opinion on several close decisions.

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Three left-handers were used by Hugh Jennings in an effort to stop the Griff's, but none of them proved around, allowing a couple of runs, including Roth's homer. Oldham lasted two, giving up five runs in the third, and Okrie, who finished, wasn't a slick as his name implies.

Two of the most brilliant catches seen here in many months were staged by Zeb Milan and Chick Shorten, rival outfielders. In the second Gharitty propelled a mighty drive to deep center, far over Shorten's head. He ran like a deer and with his back to the ball, picked it out of the air right beneath the fence.
