FORGER RECEIVES LONG JAIL TERM

Benjamin F. Fuller, alias B. Frank Fuller, former manager for Armour & Company, of Chicago, Ill., in this city, was sentenced to serve four years in the penitentiary yesterday by Justice Stafford in Criminal Court No. 2 on a charge of forging the name of Philip D. Armour to a promissory note for \$5,000. The note was dated October 18, 1919, and was drawn on the Commercial National Bank, Henry E. Davis, counsel for the accused, noted an appeal to the Court of Appeals.
