Foundry M. E. Church Is Thanks-Offering to God For Saving Georgetown Factory from British Army

Where to Worship

EUROPE THINKS U.S. TO BLAME

America Is Responsible for All Her Troubles, She Says. LARGE COAL SHORTAGE Foreign Countries Have Worries of Their Own Since the War.

Several Presidents Have Worshipped in This Temple to God Which Dates From the British Capture Of Washington in the War of 1812.

Standing in the main vestibule of Foundry Methodist Episcopal Church, Sixteenth and Church streets northwest, is a plain stone tablet that tells in a few brief words the story of the early organization of the historic old church.

The inscription reads in part: "Given by Henry Foxall of Blessed Memory as a Thanks Offering to God for the Preservation of his Foundry at Georgetown in the War of 1812."

Foxall, according to the story, was the proprietor of a prosperous iron foundry in Philadelphia at the time the seat of government of the new republic was located there.

Later, after the capital had been moved to Washington, at the request of President Jefferson he brought his factory to Georgetown and took over a government contract for the manufacture of drilled cannon and guns.

The British troops fled and the Foxall foundry was saved. Foxall learned with gratification yesterday of the action of the gathering of leaders of the movement in New York July 8 favoring the continuation of the work, even though on a reduced scale.

They declare that the Interchurch movement can no more be pronounced a failure than it can be said that the Revolutionary War was a failure because it left the Thirteen Colonies in debt.

It was unanimously decided to continue the movement, though on a greatly modified scale and with a skeletonized staff. The drive for funds will not be resumed, it is announced, but material already collected will be conserved for future use.

The movement will be continued under the direction of a committee of fifteen who are to confer with representatives of the 28 denominations co-operating in the movement, and if they deem wise, with representatives of other church bodies, and recommend plans for the future.

An effort will be made to preserve the ideal which inspired the movement and it is hoped to recover the support of the Northern Baptists and Northern Presbyterians, who recently withdrew.

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SERVES CHURCH HERE 27 YEARS

Rev. Hugh T. Stevenson to Preach Anniversary Sermon at Bethany.

The Rev. Hugh T. Stevenson, pastor of Bethany Baptist Church, who attended the Northern Baptist convention in Buffalo, will celebrate the twenty-seventh anniversary of his ordination tomorrow. For more than a quarter of a century he has held pastorates in Washington, coming to Anacostia Baptist Church, as student pastor shortly after his ordination.

The Rev. Stevenson was ordained July 11, 1893, in Englewood Baptist Church, Chicago. His second pastorate in this city was the Bethany Church, Rhode Island avenue and Second street where he came in 1905 shortly after completing his theological studies at Colgate University.

Tomorrow morning the Rev. Stevenson will preach his anniversary sermon in Bethany Church at 11 o'clock. His subject will be "The Minister's Thanks." "The Glories of the Ministry" will be the title of his evening sermon. The Young Ladies' Glee club of the church will give special musical selections.

Fact is, Europe thinks Uncle Sam is the fat man of the world. When he came into the world, and continuing until some months after the armistice, everybody loved an American. But now Europe has fresh troubles of her own and the chief of these are three:

First, The coal shortage. Second, The depreciation in the value of European money. Third, The refusal of the United States to enter the league of nations.

United States Gets the Blame. Growing out of some or all of these things are labor unrest, high cost of living, difficulty in taking up the work of reconstruction.

Don't Understand Us. They don't understand our system of government. They don't understand the kind of politics that is played in Washington, especially in a Presidential year, when both parties are jockeying for position.

They look upon us as citizens of the world, selfish country which came into the war to save its own bacon and then, having done so, put up a fence against the troubles of others who caught the same bug.

They are looking forward with keen relish and itching palms to the day when the American war profiteers who are expected to spend their holidays in Europe this summer. The process of bleeding they will look upon merely as a legitimate means of getting back something of their own.

CALLS WRITER TO SEE CRIME

Convict Summons Reporter Before Breaking Jail In Spokane.

The latest thing in select crime circles in Spokane, Wash., is to notify reporters before staging spectacular crimes, thus insuring front page position.

"Come up and see me about 3 o'clock. I'll have a good story for you," Jerome Kirk, convicted burglar awaiting transportation to the penitentiary, called a reporter.

When the reporter arrived Kirk stroled out with him into the sheriff's office, nonchalantly smoked a cigarette and then staged the most impressive jailbreak in years, loosing five other prisoners in order to cover the trail.

Kirk's weapon was a revolver, made of soap, toothpicks and tin-foil. With this he intimidated a jailer, stole his gun and got away.

But the joke's on the reporter. He got his story all right, as per promise, but the afternoon newspaper spoiled it for him. He works on a morning sheet.

Kirk, after his getaway, got aboard a street car, borrowed his gun, rode half a mile, sauntered into a home, held up a citizen and his wife, took dinner with them and rode leisurely off in their car five hours later.
