



ITALY'S TASK HARD IN TRIESTE Trieste a Storm Center of Hostile Activities of Clashing Races. SLAVS FULL OF HATE Fusillade Following Quarrel On Quay Scatters Hotel Promenaders.

Trieste, Aug. 28.—One of the most difficult problems facing the Rome government today is not Bolshevism or not Italianizing—it is the task of "Italianizing" the Austrian peninsula with its splendid port Trieste on the West and Fiume on the East. And if the status of Fiume should be settled as the government no doubt wants it, Rome would have even more trouble with the peninsula.

42 Captive Poles Found With Top Of Heads Cut Off (Washington Herald—Public Ledger Service, Special Cable Dispatch.) Warsaw, Aug. 28.—Foreign military representatives returning from East Prussian frontier confirm reports that the Twelfth, Fifteenth and Fifty-fourth Russian divisions succeeded in cutting through Polish troops by whom they were surrounded at Khorzele, reinforced with 12,000 rifles, the main Bolshevik force trying to pierce the Polish lines toward Lomza.
