30-DAY NOTICE HELD TOO BRIEF

Rent Board Again Rules Against Landlords in Two Cases.

The Rent Commission yesterday ruled again that 30 days' notice is legally insufficient to entitle the owner to possession of rented premises when it handed down four determinations.

In the case of Charles E. Zimmisch against N. L. Sansbury Co., involving the possession of apartment 10, of the Huntington Apartments, 2115 Fourteenth street northwest, the commission decided that 30 days' notice to be insufficient, and a fair and reasonable rental also was fixed at \$50 a month.

The same decision on the 30 days' notice was also given in the cases of: Elizabeth D. Payne against N. L. Sansbury Co., involving the apartments 11 and 14 of the Huntington Apartments, at 2115 Fourteenth street northwest. In this case the fair rental was fixed at \$50 a month for apartment 11 and \$47.50 a month for apartment 14.

John W. Peak against N. L. Sansbury Co., involving apartments 3 and 15 of the Huntington Apartments at 2115 Fourteenth street northwest, fair rental being fixed at \$50 a month for apartment 3, and \$47.50 for apartment 15.

Frances L. Rafferty against William J. O'Donnell, involving the premises of 3001 P street northwest, in which case the fair rental was fixed at \$35 a month.

WILSON WILL ISSUE STATEMENT FOR COX

(By Universal Service.) Edmund H. Moore, campaign manager for Gov. Cox, who has been in Washington since the Maine election striving to aid an administration leaders to the plight of the Democratic cause, left last night for New York.

It is generally understood that Moore has succeeded in impressing the Wilson men with the imperative necessity for campaign funds. Moreover, he leaves with the assurance that within a very short time President Wilson will issue the first of a series of campaign statements.

GERMANY MAY LEVY, COMPULSORY LOAN

Berlin, Sept. 17.—The levying of a compulsory internal loan is inevitable, one of the leading German bankers declared today.

President Hagenstein, head of the Reichstag Bank, is said to have worked out a complete plan for such a loan and submitted it to the government.

The Berliner Tageblatt today criticized the government for not lifting the veil covering its financial plans. It asks that the government come out frankly with a statement of intention instead of letting the mark be depressed by rumors.

Unwritten Law Frees Newport News Man

Newport News, Va., Sept. 17.—After deliberation of fifteen minutes a Warwick County jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Stanley Jones, a well-known Newport News man, charged with having shot and killed W. G. Delaney, a soldier of Langley Field.

The affair took place in Hinton Village, a suburb of Newport News, in the early part of June. The defense set up the plea of the unwritten law, alleging that the soldier had invaded one's home.

WOMEN MEET TO AID LEAGUE

Non-Partisan Organization Here Is Planned—Mrs. Gouverneur Speaks.

Formulation of plans for the establishment of the League of Nations Association, an organization "to save the league that the hope of permanent peace may not be banished from the world," were discussed at a meeting held yesterday in the Washington Hotel. The meeting was attended by prominent Washington women.

The originators of the movement plan to incorporate in the by-laws of the organization a statement of nonpartisanship in politics.
