

SAYS GERMANY NOT CONQUERED

Justice Tells Vets to Beware At Closing Armistice Ceremony.

Asserting that this nation has failed to learn the real lesson of world peace unless the American people realize the Germany of this generation cannot be trusted with any weapon to wage another war, Justice Wendell P. Stafford, of the District Supreme Court, in a memorial address yesterday afternoon at exercises conducted by the American Legion, warned against any official conduct that will nullify the fruits of peace.

Justice Stafford and Miss Mabel T. Boardman, District Commissioner, were the principal speakers. The exercises took place in a Central High School Auditorium. During the ceremonies a jardiniere of mixed flowers, the gift of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, wife of the President, was placed on the stage.

Col. James Drain, department commander, announced that Miss Pauline McVey will present the flowers to the sick nurses at Walter Reed Hospital.

Justice Stafford upheld France in her refusal to trust Germany. Miss Boardman told of her trips through the hospitals in France in 1917 and of the relations between the soldiers and the Red Cross.

"The days of the cold trenches and the hospital wards with their pictures of suffering are gone in great measure," she said, "but we must not forget that a great number of the wounded and afflicted are still with us."

Col. Drain presided. The Navy band played. There was a mixed quartet composed of Miss Agnes Whalen, Miss Richie McLean, James K. Young and Ambrose Dinkin, with Miss Mary L. Sullivan as accompanist. Benediction by John Paul Tyler, closed the services.

EMMA GOLDMAN AND PAL FLEE RUSSIA, SAYS LETTER

Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, anarchists, who were deported from the United States, have made a hurried exit from Russia, after a disagreement with Lenin and Trotsky, and are now in the Ukraine, according to a letter from Miss Goldman received in Washington.

A high government official, intimately connected with the proceedings which resulted in the last word from the famous anarchists to Russia last spring, said yesterday that they either are now at Odessa or Kiev, in Ukraine, and have no intention of returning to Russia as long as the Lenin and Trotsky regime remains in power.

Prior to the communication from Emma Goldman, recounting her differences with Lenin, the last word from the famous agitator was contained in the letters describing cold, hunger and misery in Petrograd.

In one of those communica-

tions Emma Goldman stated her intention of going to Moscow, the Soviet capital, for a personal talk with the dictator.

Describing Miss Goldman's personality as "nothing if not positive," government officials here expressed belief that it was this interview which resulted in the breach and the hastened exit.

It was reiterated definitely by immigration officials that any attempt by Goldman and her companion to re-enter the United States would be useless, as they are too well known to hope to escape detection at any American port.

It is the unanimous belief here that the two anarchists will remain in the Ukraine, awaiting the possibility of a change in the Russian government, when they will return to that country and try to take a hand, with better chances of success than under Lenin.

BAPTISTS PLAN \$1,000,000 FUND

Appropriations Announced As Washington Conference Opens Today.

Washington Baptists are expected to increase their appropriations for charitable and philanthropic work for the coming year at the forty-third annual meeting of the Columbia Association of Baptist Churches which opens in Second Baptist Church tonight, according to Rev. Hugh T. Stevenson, pastor of Bethany Church, who will preach the opening sermon. Prominent Baptists from other cities and abroad will address the meeting which will last until Thursday.

Rev. C. L. Brooks, D.D., of New York, who has just returned from Europe as Baptist commissioner on the continent, will outline Baptist activities in war-stricken countries, for which American Baptists are expected to appropriate \$1,000,000 immediately. Mrs. Orrin B. Judd, one of the leading Baptist women of the United States, will come from New York to address the meeting. Mrs. Charles G. McDaniels, who has done missionary work in Soochow, China, will tell of the needs in the foreign field.

Others who will speak are Rev. Henry E. Tralle, D.D., of Philadelphia; Rev. P. E. Burroughs, Nashville, Tenn.; Dr. R. E. Gaines, dean of Richmond College; Miss Ella Maria Holmes, who has just returned from missionary work in Gauhati, Assam, and Rev. Sparks W. Melton, D.D., of Norfolk, Va.

It is expected that a movement will be inaugurated for the expansion of the philanthropic work of Washington Baptists, since it is generally recognized that the charitable demands made upon the local denomination have outgrown the two homes for the aged now maintained in Washington.

Gas From Stove Kills Old Couple At Martinsburg

MARTINSBURG, W. Va., Nov. 14.—George Sheig, 87, and his wife, Amelia, 71, were found dead from the effects of gas from a hard coal stove in their dining room today.

Alarmed over the non-appearance of the aged couple, neighbors and police smashed in the door of their home. They had been dead about eight hours.

Hendrick Visits Station Houses in Tour of District

District Commissioner J. Thilman Hendrick is going into the second precinct police station tomorrow afternoon, of his own accord, of course.
