Government officials yesterday said they had received unconfirmed reports that Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, deported anarchist leaders, had fled from Russia into Ukraine.

They are said to have made the flight following a disagreement with the Russian government. The two anarchists were deported in the "Soviet ark" Buford along with more than 200 other undesirable aliens and sent into Russia through Finland...

Forest Fires of Past Year Sweep Half Million Acres

Twenty-seven thousand forest fires burned over 5,300,000 acres of timberland during the year ended July 31, according to Col. William B. Greeley, head of the United States Forestry Service, yesterday.

"Forest fires," he said, "are the great menace that stand between the exhaustion of our virgin forests and adjustment to a sustained yield. In that gap between the two situations so vital to the business of the country is the second growth of merchantable timber."

Forest fires must be kept from sweeping through that gap, Greeley said, in commenting on a proposed national forest policy bill drawn by the American Forestry Association.

TOSO KONNO, Japanese rice cake manufacturer, 325 Seventh street southeast—"No wedding rings, or rings of any attachment, are worn by the married couple in old Japan. Never saw or heard of the custom until I came to this country. But I don't see why men should wear them. Or why they shouldn't."

Poles Bomb Lettish Church, Kill Scores, Dispatch Says

Scores of unarmed civilians, including women and children, were killed when Polish troops bombed Kovno on Sunday, according to a dispatch received at the Lithuanian Legation yesterday. Kovno is the provisional capital of Lithuania.

At the same time, according to the dispatch, Wilkomir, fifty miles southeast of Kovno, was bombed without warning, one shell dropping through the roof of a church where services were being held and killing a number of worshippers.

BOY GETS NINE YEARS FOR FIRE

Confesses to Starting Blaze In Big Glass Storehouse On November 3.
