DR. ROBERTSON TELLS HOW TO "CATCH COLD"

SUSPECT HOLDS TO BLAST STORY

Thompson Still Denies He Blew Up House After Severe Grilling. TO ASK JURY ACTION Indictment on Murder Charge Will Be Sought, Says State's Attorney.

Despite hours of grilling by Montgomery County authorities, Guy Vernon Thompson, of Germantown, Md., doggedly maintains that he is not the man who dynamited the Bolton house Thursday morning mortally injuring James Bolton and killing instantly two sleeping babes.

The most important evidence so far, according to Detective Peter Bradley, of Baltimore, is the admission by Thompson and his wife that the suspected man was not at home on the night of the tragedy and the further admission by Thompson that he entered the Germantown store from which fifty pounds of dynamite was stolen the night before the explosion.

Will Ask Grand Jury Action. State's Attorney Dawson declares that there is now sufficient evidence on hand to indict Thompson and his wife. He will ask Judge Peters Monday to call a special session of the grand jury. Dawson will ask to have the case placed on the docket at this session of the court and tried before it adjourns.

Thompson yesterday afternoon was taken to Germantown and confronted with finger prints on the hind handled plow and on the window sill of the warehouse of Waters and Thrift from which the dynamite was stolen. He declared that the finger prints were his, according to Detective Bradley who has been conducting the investigation with Sheriff Nicholson and Detective Sergeant Fred Sandberg, finger print expert of the Washington police department.

THOMPSON DENIES GUILT

"Thompson pleads guilty to attempted burglary the night of the explosion," Detective Bradley declared yesterday, "but he maintains that he had nothing to do with the explosion. Late Friday night Thompson was taken to the undertaking parlors of W. R. Pumphrey and Sons, Rockville, Md., where he was confronted with the corpses of the children and the body of their mother. He declared that he had no knowledge of the explosion. Thompson confessed his wife was correct in saying he was absent from the house Wednesday night and early Thursday morning, but refused to divulge his whereabouts. Later, however, when taken to the police station, he admitted attempting burglary.

"We told Thompson that we had evidence that he left his house the night of the explosion," said Detective Bradley, "but he returned at 1 and then went out again and returned about morning. He admits all this and accounts for his movements but he had locked the door which he used to enter the house about 11 o'clock Wednesday night with the intention of taking some canned goods and soap from the warehouse."

"Yesterday afternoon when we took him out there he showed us how he had attempted to get in by forcing the window. Some days before, he declared, he had loomed the window which he held the window. Failing to make an entrance, however, he returned to his house at 1 o'clock," he says, "for a bunch of keys. It was his wife's accounts for his return at 1 o'clock."

"He declares that he then returned to the store with the keys, effected an entrance, but failing to find either soap or canned goods without removing anything, he denies stealing the dynamite. "He returned to his home about morning, he says, and did not learn of the explosion until his mother told him of it. 'Well, I guess you will be arrested for this,' was her comment. 'Yes, I guess I will,' he declares he replied. Then his wife asked him to dispose of the keys."

When Thompson was taken to his own house yesterday afternoon, he showed the detectives where he had buried the bunch of keys. He also showed them a small package of dynamite caps which had been concealed in the house.

Dynamite Caps Found. The authorities declare that there were not quite a dozen of the caps and that they were rusty and showed other evidence of having been exposed to the elements. It is not believed that these were the caps stolen from the warehouse of Waters and Thrift.

The eternal triangle entered into the case yesterday. Thompson admits that he had a grudge against Bolton and alleges that he had been badly treated by him. "He tried to take away my wife some time ago," he told Detective Bradley yesterday, and then he related how he had been shot by Bolton on election day.

Thanks to the generosity of residents of Rockville and Germantown the bodies of the two children will not be buried in the potter's field. Under direction of Sheriff Nicholson Miss Minnie Yearley, of Rockville, collected approximately \$100. Several persons offered apartments in their own family plots rather than see the children buried in the potter's field.

More than 500 people visited the undertaking parlors yesterday to see the bodies of Evelyn and Harold Shipley and Bolton. The children will be buried this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Bolton will be buried Monday.

TREASURY FROWNS ON INCOME TAX CHANGES

"Business men who have been enjoying unusual prosperity for years chiefly as a result of mounting prices must pocket some of the losses due to falling values and be good sports about it," said one department official close to the Secretary today.

"Provision was made this year for payment of the tax in quarterly installments merely to accommodate business men. Under ordinary circumstances the entire tax, including the installment they were deferred, would have been collected at the outset of the year.

"Furthermore, if the department should agree to the program suggested, what assurance could be given that they could pay two installments within the succeeding three months?"

The report of the Secretary of the Treasury was sent to the printer last night.

REJECTS ALIEN PROPERTY USE

Palmer Says Congress Has Sole Power to Sell German Assets.

An elaborate plan organized by a syndicate of New York bankers to extend \$2,000,000,000 credit to Germany with the \$400,000,000 assets formerly owned by Germans in this country and now in the hands of the Alien Property Custodian as security was immediately rejected by government officials here, it was learned Saturday.

"Some such plan was suggested to me by various people, but it is not now being seriously considered," said Attorney General Palmer. "The disposition of enemy property is entirely a matter for Congress to determine."

The plan is understood to have been formulated by Morgan & Co. and the Guaranty Trust Company and other banking concerns in New York. Its purpose was stated to be the stabilization of finances in this country through the extension of the immense credit to Germany which would permit the purchase of goods in the American market for German account. It was understood that German consent was obtained for the use which it was intended to make of the former German property in this country as a security for the extension of this credit. The promoters hoped, also, to obtain the consent of Francis P. Garvan, Alien Property Custodian, and of the President.

GREECE REVELS IN JOY FOR KING

People Go Wild When News Spreads That Old Ruler May Come Back.

ATHENS, Nov. 21.—All Greece last night dreamed of a return to the old pomp and glory of the court of King Constantine.

The possibility arose when the cabinet announced today that the people shall be permitted to vote November 23 on whether King Constantine shall be returned to the throne.

The news spread even faster than it could be carried by wire. It spread among the peasantry in their vineyards and gardens, among the skirted Thracians and among the soldiers. The Constantine hymn, suppressed for three years, resounded everywhere as royalists found a vision of the king restored to his people.

The royal palace will be placed in order at once. It was maintained while Alexander was king, but it was not the same as when Constantine's family ruled. Servants bustled today with a realization that a spick and spanness to an irreproachable degree must be maintained hereafter.

The grounds were shaven to an unbelievable trimness, hedges and yew trees were shaped and the way prepared for the king's triumphal return from exile.

The Greek populace could see nothing more than a resumption of the old times. The terrors and griefs of war time were swept away and a new golden age was seen. Political prisoners were freed and joined with other celebrants who paraded the streets, cheering and singing. The olive branch decoration, symbol of the Royalists, had the honor of being carried in all celebrations.

Cafes swarmed with a rejuvenated society. Even the light heartedness of the people under the well-liked Alexander was surpassed.
