Yuletide Sips To Be Scarce; Clean-up Due

Festive howls of egg-nogg, Tom and Jerry and other seasonal drinks are going to be scarce, as Christmas Day in New York is the prohibition authorities have their way.

This was the official promise of Federal Prohibition Commissioner John F. Kramer yesterday. Federal prohibition agents, together with municipal authorities and State officials, are to make a grand clean-up of all forms of bootlegging, he said.

The Prohibition Commissioner reviewed the work of prohibition enforcement in New York City from January 10 to September 30 of this year, during which time, he said, 2,450 violations of the law were reported to United States district attorneys, resulting in 608 convictions and 351 acquittals.

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 29.—A Thanksgiving tragedy in the marshlands of Currituck County ended here Saturday when Darwood S. Gallop succumbed to a dozen bullet wounds.

Gallop was gunning for ducks in the marshes near his home. Before he realized it he had reached the private preserves of a club maintained by millionaires.

The first intimation he had received of being a trespasser was when a guard fired on him. According to friends of Gallop, the guard fired eighteen times at their boat. The young man's body was riddled with bullets.

WHITE PLAGUE LEAGUE TO ASSIST CHILDREN

The Washington Tuberculosis Association, which will conduct the Christmas seal sale beginning tomorrow proposes to use a large proportion of the money received in the promotion of health work for the children of school age.

It has already ordered a new edition of 20,000 copies of its health rules which will be available for distribution to the public school children from the fourth to the eighth grades inclusive.

Surgeon General Hugh S. Cummings of the U. S. Public Health Service has added his endorsement to the Tuberculosis Christmas seal sale. He says: "It is gratifying to observe from recently published statistics that the past few years have witnessed a further decline in the death rate from tuberculosis."
