Both Robby and Pat have been exceptional leaders at handling cast-offs. This is one of the final things that a manager will do.



The SPORTLIGHT A. L. DISPUTE MAY GO BEFORE LANDIS

By Grantland Rice Opponents of Ban Insist He Must Pay Own Legal Bills.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—Renewal of the political war in the American League in which Ban Johnson, president of the league, is receiving a broadside from T. L. Huston, part owner of the New York club and Harry H. Frazee, owner of the Boston Red Sox, is causing a divergence of opinion in baseball circles.

Disruption of the league, threatened by the insurgents before Johnson and his five faithful clubs agreed to the appointment of a supreme commissioner, is not expected to occur.

Statements of Huston and Frazee that Johnson must leave before there can be peace in the American League family, is taken to mean that the warring factions will take their case before Judge Landis if Johnson tries to get the league to pay the bills for fighting the same faction in court last winter in the Ways case.

Rumors that the White Sox had been placed on the market by Charles Comiskey were blamed upon Johnson, who is being accused of trying to make Comiskey appear as a quitter under fire.

Comiskey and his faction claim that Johnson is forcing himself into the case for the glory of appearing as the prosecutor.

75 HOME RUNS, BABE'S AMBITION TWO CHAMPS OF RING FORCED TO YIELD CROWN

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—Babe Ruth, heavy-weight slugger of the New York Yankees, will make seventh-five home runs and maybe a hundred next season, he predicted after his return to New York today.

"I just got the range out at the Polo Grounds about mid-season," Ruth said. "I was disappointed if I don't slug next season. I'm all set for a good start and I'll get a hundred if I can."

There is to be no title at stake when the Mohawk A. C., 150-pound champions of the District, clash with the Metropolitan All-Stars this afternoon at Union League Park, Fifteenth and H streets northeast. But it will be worth your while to go out.
