

SUPREME COUNCIL MET 12 TIMES TO CLARIFY TREATY

Result Is Germany Has Not Paid Indemnity Nor Been Punished.

PARIS, Jan. 4.—Since the Versailles treaty, signed June 28, 1919, was put in vigor January 20, 1920, no less than twelve international conferences have been necessary to clarify different problems arising from the treaty's execution.

The following is a list of conferences and the difficulties arising at them:

- London Conference February 14, 1920
1. Allies renounced right to demand delivery of war criminals, stipulated in treaty.
2. Allies renounced right to extradite the former Kaiser.
3. Allies decided that the delays in occupation of the left bank of the Rhine would not commence until the clauses concerning the delivery of German coal had been executed.

San Remo Conference, April 19, 1920.

- 1. Another disarmament warning to Germany, which has occupied the Ruhr.
2. Allies remind Germany to keep its contracts regarding delivery of 1,600,000 tons of coal monthly to all Allies.
3. Germany demands right to keep 200,000 men under arms for police purposes.

First Hythe Conference, May 15, 1920.

- 1. France and England decide treaty must be executed without modification.
2. France consents to the fixation of a total sum as indemnity.
3. German debt set at minimum of 120,000,000 marks gold.

Second Hythe Conference, June 20-21.

- 1. Allies experts to fix reparations and to report at Spa.
2. Allies again warn Germany to reduce Reichswehr to 100,000 men, under penalty of occupation of Ruhr.

Brussels Conference, July 2-3.

- 1. Reparation of indemnity fixed "definitely." Nobody satisfied.
2. Allies tell Germany she hasn't yet executed the treaty. They cite trial of war criminals, disarmament, reparations and coal.

Third Hythe Conference, August 9.

- 1. Allies proclaim intention to sustain integrity of Poland.
2. England agrees to French proposition to go to Poland's aid with all necessary help, military and otherwise.

Summary of Conferences.

- 1. Germany hasn't paid the indemnity.
2. Germany hasn't reduced the Reichswehr and the allies haven't invaded the Ruhr.
3. England reported decided Versailles Treaty must be revised.
