

TRAPSHOOTING HAS ITS BIGGEST YEAR—FIGURERS PROMPTERS HOWL AT PRICE EDICT

TROEH'S BRILLIANT WORK FEATURE OF BEST TRAP YEAR

Nearly 8,000,000 Targets Thrown in 1920 Tournaments.

While there wasn't the same number of sensational trapshooters in 1920, the trapshooting season will go down in the history of that sport as its best.

The total number of amateurs entered in the trapshoots was 26,123 and the total number of professionals was 2,912. In the 500 tournaments registered by the American Trapshooting Association, 7,844,324 targets were thrown, an average of 15,719 per tournament.

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The longest run made by an amateur in one shoot was 311 by Charles G. Spencer. He had eleven runs over 100. Three hundred and sixty-four amateurs had runs of eight or more.
