

TRAINER BEDWELL AND JOCKEY SHILLING BARRED FROM NEW YORK TRACKS

Jockey Club Takes Action Against J. K. L. Ross Agent

Bedwell Declares He Will Ignore Notice and Charges Attempt to Persecute Him Because Of Interest in Shilling.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 14.—The New York Jockey Club people made a new move today in their war to drive Trainer Guy Bedwell and Jockey Shilling out of the employ of J. K. L. Ross, the wealthy Canadian horseman who has a big stable in Maryland.

This was in the shape of a notice from the Jockey Club of the State, which runs under New York Jockey Club auspices, that the Ross racing entries will not be accepted if either Bedwell or Shilling remains in any way in the Ross employ.

The notice was received by Mr. Ross on his arrival at his training farm near Laurel, in the form of identical letters from the president of the Westchester Racing Association, which operates Belmont Park, and the Metropolitan Jockey Club, which operates the track at Jamaica.

Letter Received by Ross. The letter from the Belmont track president follows: Dear Sir: We desire herewith to inform you that, under Rule No. 71, the entries of your stables will not be acceptable to this association if either Guy Bedwell or Shilling, who are employed by you, are in any way connected, directly or indirectly, with the same. Yours truly, (Signed) AUGUST BELMONT, President.

August Belmont, whose name is signed to the letter, is the president of the New York Jockey Club, and the letter means that under the advice from the Jockey Club, the New York track owners are to carry on the anti-Bedwell fight by blacklisting the Ross horses, as long as Bedwell and Shilling are employed by him.

Finch Takes Bitter Turn. That the fight has taken a very bitter and unusual turn is evidenced by the fact that last year both Bedwell and Shilling held trainers' licenses granted by the New York Jockey Club. Shilling, the cause of the fight, had been set down at Havre de Grace for rough riding in a race years ago, but for the last two years he has been recognized by the New York Jockey Club as assistant to Bedwell as a trainer. This year, because of the rumpus that had been raised by the New York Jockey Club over the effort to get a riding license for Shilling in Maryland, neither Bedwell nor Shilling made any application to the New York Jockey Club for licenses, but they expected to get them in Maryland.

Bedwell said this evening the entries of the Ross horses had already been accepted in New York, and that he expected to handle the Ross string at Havre de Grace, to which place the horses were shipped today. Further, he declared the entire procedure a high-handed attempt to drive him off the turf because he had tried to get a riding license for Shilling. No charge, he said, had been made by the New York people against him or against Shilling.

Voshell and Shafer Lose to Bidwell and Wheelwright in First Upset.

PINEHURST, N. C., April 14.—Ichiya Kumagae and Wallace F. Johnson will oppose each other in the final contest for the North and South championship title held by Tilden for the past two years.

Former Yale Grid Star Defeats Gardner in Last 3 Holes.

PINEHURST, N. C., April 14.—Frank Dyer, of Upper Montclair, medalist in the April tournament at Pinehurst, defeated L. L. Scofield, of Stamford, by 4 and 3 in today's second round of match play and came through to the semifinals in the upper bracket in company with Donald Parson, of the Youngstown Country Club, who took his match by default. Arthur Yates, of Rochester, and Lou Hamilton, of Garden City, also fulfilled the general predictions by coming through in the lower frame. Yates played against Dr. C. H. Gardner in the only interesting match of the round. Dr. Gardner went out in 36 and had Yates 4 down at the turn, the former Yale football star was still 3 down going to the sixteenth but won the match by 1 up by virtue of taking three in a row. Lou Hamilton, who went around in 72 yesterday, came near doing it again in today's match against F. T.
