

### FAVORS CLOSING OF UPPER WATER STREET FOR PARK

### Senate Committee Acts On Plea of Academy Of Science.

Following a short session of the Senate District Committee yesterday morning Senator Gooding, chairman of the subcommittee on streets and avenues, reported the bill authorizing the District Commissioners to close upper Water street northwest, between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets.

A communication from Charles D. Wolcott, president of the National Academy of Sciences, urging passage of the bill in order that work may be started on that building of the academy, accompanied the report. It was written several days ago by Senator Ball, chairman of the District Committee, and stated that \$1,000,000 is ready for the beginning of work.

**Meets Parking Plan.**  
Closing of the street is required in order that the parking may be continued to B street so the academy grounds can be opened. There is no law giving the District Commissioners the authority to close the street. It was pointed out by Senators that no time will be wasted in putting the bill to a vote.

The District Committee was informed by Senator Capper, chairman of the subcommittee on schools, that he would confer at once with Senator Phipps, chairman of the District Subcommittee of the Appropriations Committee on the school code.

**Considers School Relief.**  
The House District Committee is considering a plan for relief of the schools which will be considered with other school plans, following an impromptu personal inspection of the schools by Senators Capper and Ball. The hearing is expected to be held in the afternoon and introduced probably next week.

District Engineer Commissioner Kutz asked that the bill proposing a \$5,000 survey for a parkway linking the city with Fort and around the District of Columbia, which was introduced two weeks ago, be reported out as soon as possible.

Wednesday will be the regular weekly meeting date of the committee instead of Mondays, beginning May 11.


### Stockyard Officials Fake Strikers' Places

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## BALL DISCUSSES BILL EXTENDING RENT COMMISSION

### W. F. Gude Approved as James F. Oyster's Successor.

President Harding's appointment of William F. Gude to the District Rent Commission in place of James F. Oyster, who became a member of the District Board of Commissioners, was given the unanimous approval of the Senate District Committee yesterday and the nomination will be reported favorably with a view to his immediate confirmation.

### Will Ask for Attorney.

Among several changes in the bill extending the time of the law, Senator Ball proposed to ask for the appointment of an attorney for the commission, at a salary of \$5,000 a year. At a conference with President Harding Saturday this plan was given the Chief Executive's approval.

### Will Ask for Attorney.

It was the opinion of Senator Fomere of Ohio and other members of the Senate District Committee expressed at the meeting yesterday, that the housing conditions have not sufficiently improved in Washington to permit abolishment of the commission next fall. The fact that the rent commission is flooded with business, due to the strife between landlords and tenants, was taken as a good sign that the condition will continue for some time.

### Agree with Senator Ball.

District Committee members agreed with Senator Ball in his plan to introduce the new bill, which probably will be done within the next week.

### Rent Commissioners Plan Many Prosecutions

A definite step to prosecute the thousands of landlords who have ignored the decisions of the rent commission is seen in the proposed plan of Senator Ball to ask Congress to appoint an attorney for the commission, it was learned yesterday from an authoritative source.

that the Senate will approve of Senator Ball's plan. The rent law directs the commission to commence action in the Municipal Court against landlords who have charged in excess of the rent fixed by the commission.
