

SANDY BEAL WINS RENNERT HANDICAP--DERBY CANDIDATES PRIMED TO START

My Dear Beaten By Three Lengths In Pimlico Feature

Continuous Drizzle and Sloppy Track Mar Start. Commander Ross' Motor Cop Dominates Field in Sixth.

PIMLICO, Md., May 5.—A continuous drizzle settled down on Pimlico today, to the discomfort of several thousand hardy race-goers, who saw Sandy Beal, ridden by J. Mooney, carry off the monetary feature, the Rennert Handicap. The colt was thoroughly at home in the sloppy going and Dear showed surprising early speed and was the winner's closest attendant throughout the final three-quarters of the running, but hung in the final eighth after vain efforts to overtake the leader, who drew away to win by three lengths. St. Allen ran disappointingly. He retired from serious contention after a half and was a distant third. Belario, the only other starter, was always outpaced.

Comdr. J. K. L. Ross returned from Canada in time to witness the handy victory of his Motor Cop in the sixth, a six furlong condition race. Motor Cop carried top weight, 123 pounds, and dominated the running throughout. Under restraint until the middle running, Butwell was compelled to hustle at the end to win by three parts of four from the determined Dr. Devil Dog, while he displayed a dislike for the going, proved a liability in the drive for third honors over Duc De Morny, the only other starter.

STAGE IS SET FOR JAMAICA OPENING

NEW YORK, May 5.—The stage is set for the opening of the Metropolitan racing season at Jamaica tomorrow. Six events will be decided with the Pimlico handicap the feature. This is a six-furlong contest against the popular course, and across the winner will do some lightning running until the wire is passed. There are an even dozen or very good sprinters in this stakes, in fact one of the highest class fields that ever were at this event.

The 2-year-olds will have their inning in the Suffolk stakes which precedes the Pimlico. Then they will scamp around in the final event. Both are five-furlong events.

Louisville Track Officials Prepare for Record Crowd

Grey Lag Steps Full Route in Impressive Style, Despite Lameness. Sport Lovers Gathering.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 5.—Grey Lag, a chestnut son of Star Shoot, Miss Minnie, turned the most impressive workout in the final prep of candidates for the forty-seventh renewal of the Kentucky Derby Saturday. This entry from the stable of Harry Sinclair, old magnate and one-time Federal Baseball League backer, stepped the full route of one and one-quarter miles rather impressively in 2:06 4-5. Keen-eyed observers, however, noted that the colt favored his right foreleg at the finish, and shook their heads as they said, "All the Star Shoots have soft feet."

Assistant Trainer Leary immediately wired Trainer Sam Hildreth, whose preparation of the youngster has attracted a notable following both here and in Chicago. The colt looked better as he worked on the track than at the finish of the workout, and the general impression was that the lameness, if such it was, would not prevent his starting in the Derby. Grey Lag has been 5 to 1 in the ante-post betting.

Those Derby eligibles which had not worked were sent over the course in their final preparations, and tomorrow morning will see merely mild exercise gallops, just as a pugilist tapers off the day before his big battle.

Tryster and Prudery, of the Whitey stable, to which may be added Broomspan, had their work yesterday, so the public choices had only lung openers.

Among those sent the full route were Star Voter, an impressive-looking youngster by Voter, in 2:08; Billy Barton, the Cuban Derby winner, owned by President Stoneham, of the New York Giants, in 2:09; and Nancy Lee, a filly which Trainer Jack McCormick announced as a sure starter, in 2:10 2-5. Careful, another filly, stepped one and one-eighth mile.
