NEW YORK, May 22.—"Bituminous coal which a year ago was selling at the mine from \$6.25 to \$7, was freely offered this week at from \$2.25 to \$3.50. The wholesale market still remains actively competitive, and several cents decides the sale on spot coal. Very few contracts are being written," says the weekly report of the Wholesale Coal Trade Association.

GRAIN MEN OPPOSE CONTROL MEASURE NOW IN CONGRESS

Interference by Government Regarded by Element as Ruinous.

WOULD SHIFT POWER Think Laws to Control Exchanges and Packing Plants Are Too Drastic.

(Special Correspondence of The Washington Herald and New York Evening Post.) CHICAGO, May 22.—Control of the grain, live stock, and packing industries of the United States will be nothing but a rubber stamp for the secretary of agriculture, should the bills before congress pass in their present form. These will give him power to make regulations governing operations, particularly in the control of exchanges, and grain exchanges will have very little to say. A clause in the Tinker bill, section 5, article E, says that the rules of the grain exchanges are to be subject to the approval of the secretary of agriculture.
