Finest One Cent Only, On Charge Of Insecticide CHICAGO, July 25.—Mead L. Mayhew, found guilty of "insecticide," today paid the smallest fine ever assessed in a Chicago Federal court—1 cent and no costs. Mayhew is a machinist with a penchant for pet animals—rabbits, pigs, chickens, and the like. He devised an insect powder that worked so well with his pets that he decided to put it on the market. A consignment sent to a friend in St. Louis was intercepted by government officials, who brought him to trial before Judge Landis on the charge of misbranding and mislabeling an insect poison. The Department of Agriculture prosecuted the case, and Judge Landis imposed the fine of 1 cent, which included the costs to Mr. Mayhew.

Boys and Girls' Week At U. of Md. Starts Aug. 1 COLLEGE PARK, July 25.—Club week at the University of Maryland for farm boys and girls who belong to agricultural clubs throughout the State begins this year on August 1, right on the heels of the summer school which closes July 28. Two hundred or more boys and girls who have won honors in agricultural pursuits in their counties will be present. Demonstration in all of the major farm operations will be included in the course of instruction; and university professors and specialists for the extension service will comprise the teaching staff. Instruction will be confined to the morning periods of each day and afterwards will be devoted to athletics and various amusements, with motion pictures and campfire stunts in the evening. The sightseeing trip to Washington, including a visit to Mount Vernon, will be on August 4.

GREAT FALLS PARK. Attracted by the delights of a day's outing to be enjoyed at Great Falls Park, thousands spent the day there Sunday, fishing, boating, hiking and in various outdoor games and sports. WATCH CANADA FOR BANK HEAD Police Think Chicagoan May Be Heading for Northern Region. CHICAGO, July 25.—Search for Warren C. Spurgin, missing president of the Michigan Avenue Trust Company, today extended to all parts of the United States, Canada and Mexico. Especial watch is being kept on Canadian ports, as there are indications that Spurgin headed that way. Six depositors of the failed bank today filed a bill in the Superior Court, asking the appointment of a receiver. It is directed against Spurgin and all other officers of the institution. There were also lively intimations that others beside Spurgin are concerned in the \$1,500,000 grab from the institution's funds. Bank officials have further learned of Spurgin's difficulties in a bank at Espinosa, Iowa, twenty years ago. At that time Spurgin hastily departed and remained until the troubles were adjusted. Three months ago, it is said, Spurgin visited his hiding place in Florida. Mrs. Spurgin and her daughter, Vivian, have been traced to Detroit, but the police and detective agencies do not believe Spurgin himself is within 1,000 miles of them, and that he is using them to throw the pursuers off. The day before the bank failed, a box eight feet long and two feet wide was shipped from the bank to a point in Colorado. It is thought this may contain Spurgin's alleged forged papers. Definite information was obtained today that Spurgin was in Chicago at least Friday of last week. A man called to the home to assist in packing trunks and who knows him well, saw him and talked with him there.
