CHICAGO LIVESTOCK.

CHICAGO, July 27.—Receipts of livestock today were estimated at 800 cattle, 14,000 hogs, 13,000 sheep and 2,000 calves. Moderate supply of cattle, only 300 of which were billed straight to packers, was well received and absorbed in short order, though there were no further sharp advances. Angus yearlings weighed around 550 pounds, selling at \$10.00 and under. Montana wethers brought \$9.25, though they averaged more than 1,500 pounds. Hog—Fresh arrivals of swine were supplemented by a state supply of nearly 11,000. Shippers and speculative buyers bought up the fresh run by midday, paying 16a25c higher for the bulk. Prime light and butchers were salable at \$11.00a11.50, with heavy butchers bringing up to \$11.00. Packing swine ranged from \$9.00a9.50 and pigs brought \$10.50a11.25.
