

SIXTY INVOLVED
IN SWINDLE TRUST,
SAYS PROSECUTOR

Indictment of Leaders in
Banking Business Is
Predicted.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Sixty men, many of them leaders in banking and other businesses in their communities, will be indicted in connection with the alleged Charles W. French \$500,000 "swindle trust," Federal officials announced tonight.

Cot. John V. Cline, assistant district attorney, said he had sufficient evidence, which would be presented to the Federal grand jury meeting early in September, to warrant the indictments.

"I am a confidence man and I want you to have confidence in me," Charles K. Strobel, of Cleveland, one of the accused men, quoted French as telling him when questioned by Cline tonight. Strobel made a clean breast of all his relations with French, Cline said.

Asks for Defense Fund.

French asked his "angel," Zebulon W. Davis, millionaire manufacturer of Canton, Ohio, to put up \$50,000 to defend members of the so-called "big business swindlers" against charges of conspiracy to use the mails to defraud.

The appeal was sent immediately after arraignment of eight accused members of the gang before United States Court Commissioner James R. Glass, in Chicago, and a few hours after Davis was arrested at Canton.

When arraigned, all members of the alleged gang waived preliminary hearing and bond was placed at \$10,000 each.

Dramatic scenes accompanied the arraignment. French, in jail, has been separated from others with whom he worked.

Turns Back on Harshman.

French caught sight of Alva Harshman, his former secretary, who "squealed" on operations of the alleged game, declaring he had been the "goat" of the "gentle gone wrong" for many years.

French looked at Harshman contemptuously for a few minutes and then turned his back and walked away.

From the Pacific Coast today came statements to the Federal officials purporting to show that French had erected other "air castles" of finance during his twenty-five years of business life.

It was in San Francisco some years ago that French floated the \$100,000,000 Pacific Steel company, it is said. Traveling in private cars, spending thousands of dollars a day, feted by business men and capitalists, he had all the trappings of a great industrialist.

French, the main plant of which was to be located near Los Angeles.

Sued His Prosecutors.

The scheme lasted a month. Then a warrant for French for forging a \$300 check came from Salt Lake City and he disappeared overnight. He is now in private car, \$50 a day for 135 days.

He was next heard of in Phoenix, Ariz., from which city efforts were made by Utah authorities to extradite him. French later used the Salt Lake authorities and business men prosecuting him, for \$100,000. The suit never came to trial.

WINCHESTER, Va., Aug. 27.—A Pole Angus bull weighing about 1,100 pounds, burrowed his way into a straw rick on the farm of Howard Clipp, near Charles Town, and was found dead the following morning.

Asks Court Order
Property of Dead
Sister Be Shown

Herman F. Passman, brother of Matilda G. Struck, who died February 23 last, filed a petition in Probate Court yesterday requesting that his brother-in-law, Ludwig T. Struck, of 117 E. street northwest, be required to reveal the alleged hiding place of certain personal property left by the sister.

Through Attorneys Neudecker and Emerson, Jr., Passman claims that his sister owned real estate and certain jewelry when she married Struck and that the latter induced her to sign a paper renouncing his right to the property. It is also alleged that it was Mrs. Struck's intention to divide her estate between her husband and brother, excepting the real estate, which is valued at about \$4,000 and was not to be sold until three years after her death. Passman alleges the wishes of his sister have not been carried out because of the refusal of his brother-in-law to allow him access to the woman's belongings.

RAIL LABOR HEADS
STOP STRIKE MOVE

Outlaw Walkout at Cincinnati
Caused Fear of General Action.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—With an unauthorized walkout of Pennsylvania Railway shopmen in Cincinnati early in the day, putting them on the alert, the union leaders were keeping the wires hot last night in an effort to prevent runaway strikes at other points throughout the country.

Dissatisfaction with the recent order of the United States Railroad Labor Board cutting the rate of pay for overtime work, in some instances, developed a crisis it was feared might result in a nationwide walkout strike tomorrow.

However, the situation was well in control at a late hour, according to B. M. Jewell, president of the Railway Employees department of the A. F. of L. He said he believed the Cincinnati shopmen would return to work.

"Within a few minutes after our office was informed of trouble in Cincinnati," said Mr. Jewell, "we had three men from nearby cities headed that way. Their instructions were to get the men back on the job, leaving the settlement of grievances to proper authorities."

"I heard from two of these men this afternoon after they arrived in Cincinnati. They had arranged a meeting with the men, and believed the shopmen would return to work. The walkout was absolutely unauthorized."

GARAY BITTERLY
SCORES DECISION
OF U. S. ON COTO

Panamanian "Appeals to
Heaven" Against
"Injustice."

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 27.—"Panama has been forced to bow to the United States" in the award of Coto to Costa Rica, Narcisco Garay, secretary of foreign affairs of the Panama Republic, declared in his final note in the correspondence between him and Secretary Hughes. The note was made public here today by Garay.

In retaliation for the defeat of the mission which brought him to this country, he said Panama will sever telephone relations between Coto and Panama.

"In the face of the unequivocal attitude taken by the Department of State of the United States, Panama is compelled to bow to her cruel fate, but in her weakness itself, she feels sufficient energy to appeal to heaven against the injustice and the violence to which she is at present submitted, and to declare that as long as Panamanian hearts beat in the world she will keep open the deep wound inflicted by her dignity and pride, and that she will look eagerly to the future, longing for that redeeming justice which is today denied her, but that shall arrive for her some day through the inexorable design of God."
