NOTRE DAME GRID STAR NEAR DEATH NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Joe Brandy, for the last four years quarterback of the Notre Dame University football team and who ranked with George Gipp as one of the stars of the team, is today near death in the Hepburn Hospital of Ogdensburg, N. Y., of typhoid fever. Brandy, following his graduation in June, signed as athletic director of St. Thomas College at St. Paul, Minn., having a two-year contract. He had prepared to leave Ogdensburg for the West Thursday, but became ill Wednesday night. His condition has grown steadily worse and only his parents were admitted to his room in the hospital today.

"Fortune Teller" Ordered to Quit District Quickly Asked to order Dr. Kille C. Morrison, colored, sixty-seven years old, alleged fortune teller, to depart from Washington "on the wings of the morn," Judge Hardison, in police court, yesterday complied, sentencing the prisoner to the land of his birth, Massachusetts. PLANS BANQUET AND LUNCHEONS FOR CONFERENCE Fletcher Figures Cost of Entertainment Will Total \$20,000. The government's entertainment bill for the Disarmament Conference will be \$20,000. Under Secretary of State Fletcher estimated yesterday. This will be paid out of the \$200,000 appropriation just allowed by Congress for the conference. Fletcher, who is in charge of arrangements, plans to hold one large banquet, two luncheons and two receptions for the delegates to the conference. The banquet, to which 400 people will be invited, will cost about \$4,500. One luncheon for about 400 guests will cost \$2,500; and the bill for the two receptions, one to be given by Congress, is estimated at \$5,000. Ladies will be invited to the two receptions, the banquet and the luncheon. Second Luncheon for Men. A second luncheon will be held for the men attached to the conference at a cost of \$1,500. The balance of the appropriation will be spent for favors, music, invitations and other needs. The government will not pay the expenses of the various delegations, but will furnish them with offices, secretaries if desired and secret service attendants. Washington society is planning to have the conference mark the opening of one of the most brilliant social seasons in its history. The conference is expected to bring

more prominent people of the world here than any ever before. Hotels Increase Rates. The foreign delegations with their various experts and attaches are expected to total about 400 and Washington is making elaborate plans to entertain them. The housing of the delegations has become a problem. Hotels have already given notice that increased rates will be put into effect during the conference. The hotel men have declined to consider the taking over of their buildings for the exclusive use of one delegation, as was done by the American delegation at Paris. Too many regular patrons would be inconvenienced, they explain.

HARD TO SELECT Foe for Georges NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Major Wilson, the English fight promoter, who has signed up Georges Carpentier to box any opponent he may choose on December 2, is having some trouble in making a selection. Among those mentioned are Bob Martin, heavyweight champion of the American Expeditionary Forces; Frank Moran, the veteran pugilist; Boy McCormick, the English light heavyweight; and Joe Beckett, the English heavyweight champion.

County Fair Abandoned. DANVILLE, Va., Aug. 27.—The annual Henry County Fair has been abandoned this year because of the failure of crops and owing to general depression, according to an official announcement today.
