

EDWINA TAKES NASSAU SEILING STAKES A. N. Y.

Prodigious Hands Modo A Trimming in Opener Le Marsouin, 7-to-10 Favorite, Romps to Victory in Steeplechase—Lieut. McCreery Wins Army Event on Courteous.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Edwina, the 3-to-5 favorite, skipped through the soft going at Belmont today, victorious in the Nassau Seiling stakes. As she rolled down the stretch and passed the pacemakers the crowd cheered her on. She was well played, even at the short odds and furnished a pleasing sight to her admirers.

Johnson, who rode her, laid behind Knight of the Heather and Crystal, which cut out a merry pace. They slackened their strides as they swung into the home path. Johnson then turned Edwina loose and it didn't take her long to sail to the front. Once in the van the race was over. She ran the mile in 1:40 1-5, which was anything but speedy.

This was the day the 10 per cent penalty became effective for scratching. The soft condition of the track drove five out of the first mazes. Three of these were H. P. Whitney's, so it hurt his bankroll. The youngsters not showing in his colors. Montford Jones paid \$125 for not sending St. Henry and James Johnson a like amount.

In the opener Modo was a 2-to-5 favorite. The favorite looked the best before the race, but in the running was not so good. He got off last and made every effort to get to the front. He could not turn the trick, however, and came home behind Prodigious. Black Rascal was the only other starter. Many were the hearts that were high the breaking point when the finish was staged.

Right after the startling result raindrops started to patter down. It made little difference to the crowd, however, as iron hats and raincoats were the order of the day. Le Marsouin, the 7-to-10 favorite in the steeplechase, cantered home to an easy victory.

Captain Alcock showed he was a running fool in the Amityville Handicap. Left factoring at least twelve lengths behind when he started to hoof it. The Captain was a 4-to-5 favorite, and his backers toppled over for he looked like a champion. Little Mooney kept him stepping in the stretch he was close to Irish Dream and Chateau Thierry.

At the sixteenth mile the Captain hooked up with the pair. There came a spirited struggle, but the Captain was the gamest and dropped over the line two lengths ahead of good. Chateau became a favorite for second money. At the start the last two were the only ones to get moving. It was the worst start of the meeting.

Lieut. Thomas McCreery, better known to the old turfites as Tom, showed his skill when he rode Courteous to victory in the United States army officers' race. This was a trip over 1 3/4 miles, each runner carrying 150 to 170 pounds.

It was an interesting spectacle as the field passed the stand on the first leg of the journey. The Lieut. on Courteous was squatted and held his charger in restraint as they made the turn into the back stretch. Avon Bear led by ten lengths and Katie Canal second and Courteous third.
