INDIANS AGAIN TRIM GRIFFS, 8 TO 4--WESTERNERS LEAD AT WATER FIELD

Sothoron's Teasers Fool Nats; Mogridge Knocked Out Early

Cleveland Pitcher Sets Record for Killing Time And Peeves Moriarty by Tampering With Ball--Joe Bird Makes Bow Here.

The Indians increased their lead over the Yankees to one full game yesterday when they clubbed George Mogridge off the mound in the second inning, and peppered a pair of McBride's recruits, winning a glorious and thrillsome battle by a score of 8 to 4.

Allyn Sothoron, the castoff from St. Louis and Boston, administered the defeat to the Washingtons, stretching the painful performance out for two full hours with his dilatory tactics. Al's chief points of excellence are a good spitter, a tantalizing change of pace and a horrible waste of time.

If Faber holds the record for the fewest balls pitched in a game, Al holds the pewee cup for the highest total. Roughly estimated, he tossed 365 from start to finish, over half of which were futile leaves to first.

Sothoron Peeves Moriarty. Everybody in the park, including Empire George Moriarty, had become nervous before the game was half over. Much to the dismay of Moriarty, Sothoron insisted in tampering with the ball, applying his thumb nail to the covering until a rough spot the size of a dollar was formed. Just what Moriarty is doing, but it didn't suit McBride.

As soon as Moriarty would discover a damaged pellet he would confiscate it, and lay it away in a pocket for future reference. Soon he had a pocket full.

Just for pure cussedness, Al gave the Griffis seven bases on balls. These lapses aroused the hopes of the fans, but they quickly subsided. There never was a chance to get started on one of those old-time big innings.

After Mogridge had gotten his bump early, Frank Woodward took a fling at the champs. He did very well for a couple of innings, using a deceptive hook to good advantage, but was supplanted by pinch hit Joe Bird when one of those near rallies loomed.

Bird Makes His Debut. Woodward's departure gave Joe Bird, the Shreveport (Texas) southerner, a chance to make his bow. Woodward's hook was a fine one, but it was not to be. The Texan works with pleasing form and displayed a fair amount of stuff.

Woodward made a sudden blow at the batsmen, but he was not to be. Tom Phillips, the leading pitcher of the Southern League, was warming up in the bullpen. His debut was postponed until a later date.
