HARDING TO SPEAK AT WILLIAM AND MARY CEREMONIES

Will Attend Installation Of Dr. Chandler as Head of College.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., Sept. 19.—With President Warren G. Harding as the principal speaker, Dr. J. A. C. Chandler will be formally installed as president of the College of William and Mary on Wednesday, October 19, it was announced today.

College Heads Will Attend. Distinguishing men and women from many parts of the nation, leaders in many walks of life, will attend the installation ceremonies.

Leaves Here on Mayflower. President Harding will be accompanied by Mrs. Harding when he makes his visit. What friends will accompany the President and Mrs. Harding is not known at present, but it is understood that the Presidential party will consist of friends who share the President's desire to visit the Colonial capital of the historic surroundings.

Has Served for Two Years. Although he will be formally installed on October 19, Dr. Chandler has been president of William and Mary for two years. The installation, owing to a bereavement in Dr. Chandler's family, and the desire of the college authorities not to conflict last June with the centennial celebration of the University of Virginia.

Under Dr. Chandler's guidance William and Mary has made great strides forward, and the belated installation is somewhat in the nature of a tribute to his successful administration. America's second oldest institution of higher learning, the college has gained greatly in enrollment and equipment since Dr. Chandler assumed active direction of its affairs, and is today ranked as the fastest growing collegiate institution in the United States, according to the compilations of the Institute for Public Research of New York.

Graduate of Johns Hopkins. Before coming to William and Mary as president, Dr. Chandler was superintendent of schools of Richmond, Va. He is a graduate of Johns Hopkins and Johns Hopkins University.

Among American colleges, the position of William and Mary is unique. The alma mater of many of America's greatest statesmen, including John Marshall, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe, John Tyler, Winfield Scott and Peyton Randolph, she was the American college which gave George Washington his first public office, that of surveyor. At the time of his death, Washington was chancellor of William and Mary. The institution was the originator of the honor and elective systems, and had the first schools in America of law, modern languages, political economy and history. Her graduate, William Barton Rogers, founded the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

KEITH'S. COSMOS.

Freshly hennaed and bobbed, the buxom, blithe and bouncing Emma Carus holds forth at Keith's with her usual aplomb, verve and diablerie. Really, the mere medium of language seems insufficient to celebrate this lady's remarkable qualities. She is just—Emma Carus. Time, tide, not even a stern censor, floweth against her. Her performance, but, then, isn't refinement a meager and attenuated virtue, saving more of the requirements of the nursery governess or the star boarder than of the amusement of America's vast and admiring audience's methods or not, you will be unable to resist liking her, her frank and beautifully hennaed cheeks, her dumping figure and crooked, gay smile.

His feat, disclosing surprising mental feats, is nevertheless, rather dry in effect. It may be sacrilege, but we can't help thinking that a couple of charming girls would perhaps be a more attractive feature, while Mack Bennett's "Fickle Fancy" leads the numerous other film attractions at all performances, including the International News pictures.

METROPOLITAN. "The Sign on the Door." The notably fine character portrayal with which Norma Talmadge distinguishes her most recently released photodramatic vehicle, a splendid picturization of Channing Pollock's successful play, "The Sign on the Door," at the Metropolitan Theater, perhaps offers a more concrete and more comprehensive reason than has heretofore been advanced for her recent winning of a national popularity contest conducted in the 5,000 first-grade picture houses controlled by Associated First National franchise holders by the Moving Picture World.

Miss Talmadge in this subject combines elements of charm which have been arrayed before the fascinated eye of the spectator one at a time. The results of the voting furnish many interesting commentaries on the standing of the various stars now occupying the screens of the country.

With over 150,000 votes cast in over fifty of the biggest cities the results gave Norma Talmadge a comfortable lead of 16,000 votes over her hither Constance, who finished second. Mary Pickford was a close third, with Anita Stewart and Katherine MacDonald rounding out the first five.

A short time ago motion-picture producers believed that the public would not accept the mature woman as a star. The comment of Herbert Howe, prominent motion-picture writer, on this subject is interesting. Says Howe: "Recent events seem to point to a change in type, or, rather, a lifting of restriction as to ideals. Norma Talmadge has earned steadily in favor. Pola Negri, the dark beauty, has received with ovation in 'Passion.' Katherine MacDonald, of a statuesque dignity, has proved a winner."
