

BOTH PARTIES CONFIDENT OF OUTCOME IN VIRGINIA ELECTIONS TOMORROW

TRINKLE FORCES AT ALEXANDRIA CLAIM BIG LEAD

Republicans, However, Expect to Make Considerable Gains.

FIRE DRAWS CROWD Thousands Watch Flames Lick Up Barn Full of Hay.

THE HERALD BUREAU, ALEXANDRIA, Va., Nov. 6.—The Democrats here predict a clean sweep for State Senator E. Lee Trinkle for the governorship on Tuesday, and also for the entire ticket, including local offices. The Republicans, on the other hand, claim they will make considerable gains, in fact, that their candidate for governor, Col. Henry W. Anderson, will lead the ticket.

The polls here will open at sunrise and close at sunset. The voting will be done in the usual voting places. The banks and city offices will be closed all day Tuesday, election day being a legal holiday in Virginia.

Local candidates for office who have opposition are Commonwealth's Attorney Howard W. Smith, who is opposed by John Barton Phillips; Nevell S. Greenaway, clerk of the courts, who is opposed by Capt. Albert Beatty; F. G. Ehardt, who is opposed by Ferdinand DeVaughan, and Charles Henry Smith, nominee for the State legislature, who is opposed by Mrs. M. M. Beckwood, of Arlington County.

Fire of undetermined origin shortly before 8 o'clock tonight destroyed the large frame barn of Mrs. M. Beatty, in the care of her residence, 1701 King street. The barn contained a quantity of hay and made a big blaze, which attracted a crowd of several thousand people. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

It is believed that the blaze may have been started by tramps who dropped a lighted cigarette stump in the hay.

Fairfax County Prisoner Flees Clarendon Jail

CLARENDON, Va., Nov. 6.—James King, arrested in Fairfax County, charged with robbery and caught in an attempt to escape from the Fairfax jail, and who on October 4 was transferred to the Arlington County jail for safekeeping, escaped from jail here early yesterday morning by using a hacksaw.

After showing the bags he dropped from the second-story window, Jailer Kines, hearing the noise, fired several shots at the fleeing prisoner. King proceeded to the home of William Marcey, near Cherry, where he was preparing to go to Washington market and, telling him he had been beaten and robbed, Mr. Marcey fed him and later took him to Washington to board the Baltimore car.

It was not until several hours later that Marcey learned he had unwittingly aided a fugitive.

RAILROAD TO BUILD TO POINT LOOKOUT

UPPER MARLBORO, Md., Nov. 6.—The Washington, Brandywine and Point Lookout Railroad has decided to extend its road to Point Lookout. At a meeting of stockholders the capital stock of the company was increased to \$500,000 to provide for the extension. Rep. PETER G. TEN EYCK, Democrat of New York, who is celebrating his forty-eighth birthday anniversary today. Representative Ten Eyck was born in Bethlehem, N. Y., and is the descendant of two generations of New York and five mayors of Albany. He was graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in 1886, and has been interested in technical engineering. Mr. Ten Eyck was elected to Congress in 1913, and is one of the few members of the New York delegation who survived the Republican landslide last year.

IRISHMAN TO SPEAK AT LUNCHEON TODAY

James H. Douglas, representative of the Society of Friends of Dublin, Ireland, who directed the distribution of the fund raised in the United States last spring by the American Committee for Relief in Ireland, will be the principal speaker at a luncheon given in his honor at the Shoreham Hotel at 1 o'clock today by the District committee which raised \$100,000 in Washington for the fund.

Mr. Douglas is in the United States to thank the American people for their aid and to explain details of distribution of the fund. He will arrive in Washington this afternoon and will stop at the Shoreham. A committee composed of Peter A. Drury, Daniel W. O'Donohue, Senator David I. Walsh and Andrew I. Hickey will meet him at Union Station this afternoon.

ALLEGED HANGING VICTIM IN PRISON

LEAVENWORTH, Kans., Nov. 6.—Albert Curtis, negro, serving a 20-year commuted life sentence in the Federal penitentiary, is the negro who, Senator Watson of Georgia, is reported to have declared was hanged in France without a court martial, prison authorities stated tonight.

Curtis was sentenced in the La Rochelle area by Judge Advocate Julius Dorensfeld, who heard the case before the military tribunal, it was declared. Records of the prison show Curtis' crime was an attack on a young French girl.

WONDERFUL CAVE BEING DEVELOPED NEAR WOODSTOCK

Neff Caverns Said to Be Most Beautiful Yet Discovered.

WOODSTOCK, Va., Nov. 6.—Beneath the orchard belonging to the Neff Orchard Company, situated on the Southern Railway several miles south of Mount Jackson and adjoining the famous "Turkey Knob" orchard, lies a cave so magnificent in its stalactite and stalagmite formations that prospectors, well acquainted with the other famous caverns in the valley, have pronounced the Neff cave the most beautiful thus far discovered. Twenty-two subterranean rooms and grottoes have been explored and a number are yet to be opened.

The crystal formation throughout the cave is unusually brilliant, a striking feature being a cataract formed by a million years of erosion in the limestone strata, and two lakes, which scintillate and sparkle like bowls of priceless gems. This undeveloped wonderland has recently been purchased by Hunter B. Chapman, of this place, and J. D. Major, of New Market, and the purchasers hope to have the cave open to the public in the spring of 1922. The beautiful Luray Caves and the Endless Caverns, of New Market, have already given the Valley of Virginia a worldwide notoriety. The opening of this third subterranean world of beauty will greatly enhance its fame.


