scrapped. Practical economy is being sought and plans advocated by naval experts for conversion of these funds so they can be used to speed up work on the vessels to be completed, or, if Congress desires, for converting the doomed battle cruisers into aircraft carriers, for construction of submarines, aircraft, or for other afloats needed to round out the fleet.

Revives 5-5-3 Issue. The personnel question has a direct bearing on the 5-5-3 ratio established for capital ships. It is pointed out by naval officials that drastic reduction in the personnel would necessitate a tie-up of many ships in home ports for a relative reduction in the efficiency of our fleets—a getting away, in other words, from the 5-5-3 basis under other navies made corresponding reductions.

Relative Personnel. At present there are approximately 101,000 enlisted men in the American navy with 7,400 commissioned and warrant officers. The British navy has about 100,000 men with 9,827 officers, not including about 1,000 aviation officers. The Japanese navy has about 73,500 men with 13,572 officers.

British's Long Enlistments. Enlistments in the British navy, on the other hand, are for a twelve-month "batch," with a ten-year period following to complete the time necessary for a pension. About three-fourths of the British naval personnel is now serving the normal period of the twelve-year service with 21,000 serving the second continuous period of ten years.

STRIKE HOLDS UP TEXTILE WAGE CUT. BOSTON, Feb. 5.—Textile manufacturers in the larger Massachusetts mill cities appear to be holding up any wage reduction they may be contemplating, pending the outcome of the strike situation in the Pawtucket Valley of Rhode Island, where general 20 per cent wage cuts have been effected. While the week-end brought new reports of wage cuts in some of the smaller textile centers, mill officials in Lawrence and Fall River issued statements declaring that present wage schedules would be continued in those cities for at least three months, and the general belief is that by that time the Rhode Island situation will have been cleared and that the action of the larger mills will be based on the outcome.
