**JEWISH RELIEF WINS PLEDGES**  
**Total Exceeds Sum Asked And May Go Beyond \$17,000,000.**  
**BEATS ALL RECORDS**  
**Chairman Reports Non-Jews Contributed More Than \$1,000,000 to Fund.**

demonstration of human sympathy of which Americans and American Jews in particular may well feel proud.

Mr. Brown made his report public before returning to his home in Detroit, where he will conclude the campaign. He has been at his desk at national headquarters here since the opening of the big drive early last October, when he cancelled a European trip to assume the chairmanship.

The extraordinary character of the Jewish effort is shown in an analysis of the back of the campaign presented in the report. "Beginning in 1914," it says, "there was projected throughout this country a series of campaigns, many of which had back of them the support of the governments of the United States, as well as the governments of allies. Some of them had a straight patriotic appeal, and all were conducted during a period of the greatest prosperity this country has ever known. Yet the largest amount of money raised per capita during this period was approximately \$1.20. Some of the campaigns produced a per capita as low as 5 cents, others 10 cents, 25 cents and 50 cents."

The two previous large Jewish relief campaigns, in 1917-18 and 1919-20, Mr. Brown pointed out, produced \$10,000,000 and \$12,000,000, respectively, the latter being a non-sectarian appeal.

Grateful to Non-Jews.

On behalf of his associates, Chairman Brown pays special tribute to "the many non-Jews who have not only given of their money to the extent of over \$1,000,000, but who have supported us in every way."

"Last but not least," he adds, "we want to thank the newspapers of this country which have given us freely of their valuable space, and which have been ready at all times to tell the story in such a manner as to bring forth the greatest response."

NEW YORK, March 15.—Actual cash and pledges totaling \$14,009,624.19 in hand, and a total of \$17,310,000 assured by April 1, is the record of the national campaign for relief of Jewish war, pogrom and famine sufferers in Eastern Europe, National Chairman David A. Brown announced tonight in a preliminary report.

Eight of the forty-eight States are still to complete their campaigns. More than \$1,000,000 was given by non-Jews, Mr. Brown said, in this enterprise which surpasses any humanitarian effort by the Jews of America.

**Urges New System Of Paying Salesmen**

"Salesmen should be paid on the amount of his collections rather than on the prevailing basis of sales," was the suggestion of Carl C. Mueller, treasurer of the George J. Mueller Company, at the weekly credit clearing house of the Washington Association of Credit Men at the City Club yesterday.

Mr. Mueller said that in these hard times the investigation of this plan results in a higher percentage of earnings for the salesmen and a larger percentage of loss to the business house instituting it. It is now being worked satisfactorily in a number of cities.

It is the plan of the Washington Association of Credit Men to give serious thought to this change in the method of payment of salesmen, and J. H. Hovey, superintendent of Bradstreet's, is heading a committee which is making an investigation of this innovation.

Philip H. Sinclair, of the Cleveland Discount Company, also designated to take charge of the weekly luncheons of the Washington Association for the next month.
