

WILL DO HONOR TO GEN. MEADE

Secretary Weeks to Talk Tuesday at Memorial Ceremonies.

WORK WILL BEGIN

Actual Construction to Involve Gradual Moving of Botanic Garden.

The ceremony marking initiation of actual construction of Meade memorial which has been for ten years under consideration, will be held in the Botanic Garden Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, according to an announcement yesterday of Lieut. Col. C. O. Sherill, superintendent of public buildings and grounds.

The superintendent revealed that the director of the Botanic Garden has consented to the removal of the iron fence around the garden. This is said to be the first step in the moving of the garden to a new site south of the Capitol.

Garden to Be Moved

It is now contemplated, says the announcement, that the garden will be moved gradually to areas on the site of the old James Creek canal south of the Capitol. In these areas it will be possible to grow a series of flower gardens and develop greenhouses.

Weeks Will Talk

Secretary Weeks and William C. Sproul, governor of Pennsylvania, will make short addresses after Tuesday's ceremony. Representatives of civil war veteran organizations, particularly those of the Army of the Potomac, will attend. The memorial depicts the famous Union leader and Gettysburg commander, ready to step forth from the cloak of conflict into the future era of progress. Chivalry, at his right, and loyalty, at his left, hold back the cloak, while loyalty holds over the head of the general a standard of wreath and garlands. Fame, progress, war, courage, and energy are depicted in the group.

Actual Work to Begin

Immediately after the ceremony, the contractors, Simon and Simon, of Philadelphia, will begin actual construction. The full size model of the memorial already has been completed and accepted by the two commissions charged with the work.

Yet I am convinced personally that all the way from New York to San Francisco the mass mind of the people, or at least the mass mind of the men and women who represent the active, intelligent, constructive and educated thought of the United States, were ready for a leadership which would participate and indeed prevail in that conference, which is one doomed to failure in its larger aspects because of the non-participation of the United States.

GETS 4 YEARS FOR ROBBERY

Youth Sentenced For Hold-Up of Chain Store Manager.

REP. BRAND PLEADS

Says Branham Was Drunk At Time Crime Was Committed.

Walter R. Branham, 26, former employee of the Shipping Board and the Piggly Wiggly stores who pleaded guilty to holding up John J. Starnes, manager of the Arcade Market Branch of the Piggly Wiggly store at Seventh street and Pennsylvania avenue northwest on February 18 last and robbing him of \$1,061, was sentenced to serve four years in the penitentiary yesterday by Chief Justice McCoy in Criminal Court.

Gets Four Years.

Cleveland Smith, colored, was sentenced to serve two years each on two charges of robbery. One indictment alleged that on November 24 he held up and robbed Walter Patterson, of 535 L street northwest of \$18. The other indictment alleged that on the same day Smith held up and robbed Tony Silver, a grocer, of 1732 Seventh street north-west, of \$50.

Stole Vegetable.

Jeffries Payne, colored, was sentenced to serve three years on a charge of grand larceny. The indictment alleged that on January 2, last, he stole a truckload of vegetables belonging to George C. Holder, of 3507 Twelfth street northwest.
