ALEXANDRIA "V" FUND CLIMBS TO TOTAL OF \$55,000 Promoters Expect Goal of \$75,000 to Be Reached By Tomorrow. EXHIBIT HOLDS OVER Merchants' Display Will End Tonight After Big Run.

A. building here was \$55,000, of which \$10,000 was contributed today. These figures were announced at the luncheon held in the rooms of the chamber of commerce, at which members of the Kiwanis Club were guests. Only \$20,000 more is needed to reach the goal. There is every indication that by Saturday the drive will go over the top. The promoters of the movement, which is headed by Capt. C. Keith Carlin, are elated by the showing made thus far. At the luncheon an address was delivered by Rev. Dr. James Shea Montgomery, chaplain of the House of Representatives. The Greater Alexandria Trade Exhibit will continue over tomorrow night. It was to have ended tonight but it was decided to hold it over.


DWARF ACQUITTED OF ASSAULT CHARGE Elmer Humes, alias Richard Humes, four feet high and weighing seventy-five pounds, who was alleged to have been one of four men who dragged Mrs. Hallie L. Madden, of 810 Twelfth street northwest, into an automobile in broad daylight in front of her home on March 24 last, was acquitted yesterday in Criminal Court No. 1 on a charge of attempted felonious assault. Mrs. Madden charged that Humes and three others forced her to get into an automobile and drove to Brentwood road and T street northwest and attacked her. Unusual Radio Set at 3ZY Photo shows radiophone receiving set used at amateur station 3ZY, 2375 Champlain street northwest, operated by L. M. Dunnam and Herbert A. Wadsworth. The transmitting set, not shown here, has been heard on occasion in San Juan, Porto Rico, and Cristobal, Canal Zone. The receiver shown above has been improved recently to increase signal strength and obtain sharp tuning. It will be noticed that there is a smaller coil inside the usual loop. This smaller coil is in series with a tapped loading coil and variable condenser. It acts as the primary circuit for coupling to the secondary of the loop when the antenna and ground are connected. Sharper tuning is said to be possible when small inductance coils are used for coupling and tickler. This set, which is on exhibit at 734 Eleventh street, employs two stages of audio frequency amplification, and is used regularly in connection with a magnavox.

WIRELESS SERVICE TO ARGENTINE NEAR NEW YORK, May 4.—Wireless service to Argentina and other sections of South America will be opened in the near future, according to Edward J. Nally, head of the Radio Corporation of America, who has just returned from a wireless conference between leading companies of Great Britain, France and Germany. The Argentine station will communicate with New York, Paris, Berlin and London. Preliminary tests for a station in Brazil are being made. Radio is spreading throughout Europe, Nally said.
