WASHINGTONIANS PRESENT OPERETTA AT BELASCO

Fine Vaudeville Programs Offered This Week At Keith's and Cosmos.

In selecting for their spring re-appearance the Victor Herbert piece that Fritz Scheff made popular years ago, the Washingtonians, or their director, may be said to have shown judgment rather than a reckless devotion to high ambition. Marked like all the composer's work, by music of original touch and masterly orchestration, the opera, nevertheless, offers no overpowering difficulties to a capable amateur group, so far as singing goes, and meets more nearly the popular standards of the day than some of the society's other undertakings.

The result is a production that proves thoroughly enjoyable. The large audience at the Belasco last night was enthusiastic.

Perhaps the ground for wishing that an opera had been selected with a longer list of musical numbers and correspondingly less time devoted to the dramatic element, in which the amateur shortcomings of a musical organization necessarily show forth. Comic acting is a difficult art, and it is not to be associated with good voices in the run of a city's entertainments.

Estelle Murray, of course, in the important part of Edith, carries the day with the grace, charm and assurance that are always hers. Her soprano has gained in power and retains its sweetness. The production owes much to Miss Murray's talent.

Mr. Fitzgerald in the tenor role is satisfactory. The occasional profundo notes heard from Mr. Perkins made one wish they had more of a chance. Jacques Homier, in a comic part, has at least one opportunity to display his charming baritone.

A particularly pleasant feature was the toe dance introduced in the last act, with a delicate, fascinating art, by one mysteriously listed in the program as "The Toe Dancer."

Then Belle does the matchless "wop" number with that vicious refrain of "I gotta da proof," delivered in a dozen different crackling, biting, shivering inflections. By this time you are fully aware that what you took for a pretty pussy is nothing less than a young wildcat. Miss Baker is a singer who reflects credit upon that often misused word "artist." She can detonate a significant phrase as though it was a charge of high explosive. At times she shows a vitality of dexterity worthy of a Yvette Guilbert. She never stooped for her effects. To even banal songs she brings a shimmering touch. But we did wish that she had given more new numbers yesterday afternoon, instead of so many of the old songs. Most men will not appreciate Miss Baker's gown. But the women will realize the master touch in its severe, graceful lines and exquisite touches of color.

Eschert as usual, the Watson Sisters scored high on the program. "Very few men would marry you," said little Fanny Watson. "A very few would be enough," retorted sister Kitty, playfully galloping about. From which it will be seen that the sisters remember a bit of the old burlesque.

The beautiful polo pony exhibited by Bob Anderson is much more endearing than the average thespian. There is really no end to the cleverness of this equine actress.

"Thank You Doctor" is founded on a real crime occurrence of a year or so ago when a lady crook had a jeweler's clerk committed to an insane asylum as relative with a maniacal belief that he was the jeweler's clerk. This done, she drove off with jewels enough to satisfy an Indian prince. In the play this diverting incident has been "doctor" slightly and the lady highbinder is trapped and all ends well.

The Quixy Four is a quartet of young men who look frightfully stupid, but have only to open their mouths to convince you that they are "not stupid." They sing remarkably well and their saxophone-banjo performance was a thing of joy. In point of applause they played second to no other act in the program and it was too bad that they did not have time to do encore. Several delightful songs were featured by Lois Josephine and Leo Henning, who also dance with much grace. Beatrice Flint looks surprisingly like Mrs. St. John. Her partner, Ralph C. Bevan, wears a surprising strawberry nose. The pair of them are capable vaudevillians, although some of their stuff is a bit grating. Will Hale balances himself on a ball just like a trained seal, while his brother cheers him on and lambastes him alternately. Pax vobiscum.

Funeral services for Col. Clement Alexander Finley Flagler, who died yesterday at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, will be held in Washington tomorrow at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church. Burial will be in Arlington National Cemetery. Military honors of a major general, which rank he held during the world war, will be accorded.

Col. Flagler is the second world war major general to die this month, the other having been Maj. Gen. James McAndrew, who died early on the morning of May 1. For the past several months Col. Flagler has been a patient at Johns Hopkins, where he has been suffering a complication of disease.

He was in Funston's expedition to Vera Cruz in 1914, where his engineering work attracted considerable attention. At one time he was military attaché at Rome.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Flagler, and a sister, Mrs. George MacKeen, who lives in Canada.

Information is lacking of any attempt being made by the negroes to organize for attacks upon the whites.

It is shown, however, by reports received by Gov. Neff today that the white people of Fairfield, Kyren and other towns are apprehensive of an uprising of negroes to retaliate for the burning to death of three negroes last Saturday and the hanging of another negro last night.

To prevent a possible race war, Gov. Neff today ordered two detachments of State rangers to proceed immediately to Fairfield. This was done at the request of Sheriff W. W. Hayo, of Freestone County. Sheriff Mayo notified the Governor the negroes of the country are threatening to avenge the burning of three negroes.

Capt. Frank Hamer and a detachment of rangers left this evening from Austin while another detachment under Capt. Tom Hickman will proceed from Fort Worth.
