HOUSE VOTES AD TO U. S. EMPLOYEES 60 YEARS OF AGE

The House yesterday passed legislation extending provisions of the retirement act to government employees sixty years old who have served the government fifteen years.

Representative J. Charles Linthicum, of Maryland, spoke in favor of the bill and deplored the wholesale dismissal at the Navy Yard and the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.

Representative James Mann, of Illinois, opposed the bill, insisting that the government should not have obligations to government employees, and should not be expected to offer relief to them all the rest of their lives.
