

DUNDEE-CHANEY GO TO POST TO FIGHT WOMEN IN NET FINALS TODAY

FREEMAN DELAYS BOUT; CONFUSION SPOILS CHANCES

Actions of "Scotch Wop" Force Blocking of Today's Plans.

Promoter Joe Freeman at a late hour last night postponed the scheduled twelve-round bout between Johnny Dundee and K. O. Chaney, of Baltimore, booked for this afternoon at Laurel, Md., for a period of approximately ten days.

After the New York Boxing Commission ruled yesterday that Dundee carry out his contract for the go with Chaney, Promoter Freeman made a desperate attempt to get his card in shape for a battle this afternoon, but the earlier cancellation of the bout of Dundee has so wrecked plans that the postponement was declared necessary at the last minute.

Dundee Promises Fight.
Freeman said last night he had a wire from Dundee guaranteeing a \$1,000 forfeit for a match with Chaney in the near future. Dundee made the same offer with the Maryland Boxing Commission, and Freeman is now rearranging his schedule to pull the show for the Laurel American Legion Post about a week from Saturday.

Contract Speaks.
Presented with contracts and facts in the case by representatives of Freeman and the Laurel American Legion Post, the New York commission yesterday commanded Dundee to appear and fight it out with Chaney.

Washington fans will soon have their best chance to see a title-go in many moons. Dundee is the world's junior lightweight champion. He slipped away from Chaney in their only other meeting, last winter, when the referee called a foul on Chaney in the eighth round. Ringside critics averred there was no foul but the decision held and Dundee has been dodging around since then. Freeman has been drilling Sam Harris to match his mauling protegee - another go with the "Scotch Wop."

Chaney Plans K. O.
Sam Harris is confident K. O. Chaney is going to send the New Yorker into dreamland before the twelve rounds of scheduled fighting are run out. Chaney has been drilling hard for the match and angered over the latest move of Dundee to give him the slip is determined to settle matters quite decisively.

Promoter Freeman has arranged an all-star card for the match and Frankie Rice, another of Sam Harris' scrapping youngsters, will take on Joe Egan in a lightweight mixup booked for ten rounds. Rice has shown his prowess in the past for the last two seasons around hereabout and by his aggressive style has gained a host of followers. The young Baltimorean is picked to knock the Quaker City fighter for the count before the conclusion of the ten rounds.

Young Ahearn to Fight.
Washington will be represented in the program by Young Goldie Ahearn, who goes on in a semi-windup affair slated for six rounds of mauling with Kid Bosay of Baltimore. Young Ahearn has a record of 12 wins, 10 to his last two opponents at his grand fans in this city are pulling for three in a row. The two are featherweights.

Charlie Baum, of Baltimore, will punch with Johnny McGuire, Philadelphia, in a welterweight encounter, for up to and including six rounds, or any part thereof.

LEAGUE MAY NAME PALESTINE RULERS

British Offer to Submit List of Candidates Representing All Religions.
LONDON, July 3.—Anxious to remove fears regarding the rights of Christians under the Palestine mandate, the British foreign office has offered to nominate a list of candidates representing all religions of the interested powers, from which the league of nations or some other disinterested authority can elect the members of the Palestine commission.

This offer was made by the foreign office in a note to the league of nations, replying to complaints of Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State, regarding the rights of Christians under the mandate for Palestine. The foreign office intimated Cardinal Gasparri imperfectly understood the terms of the mandate, which the note said carefully and fully protected the rights of all religions. The Zionist organization, the foreign office stated, has no rights regarding governmental affairs, being merely entitled to develop the country.
