## CREATORS IN RADIO FIELD FAILED TO PROTECT PATENTS

Crude Construction of Early Sets Led to Many Suits.

### RECENT RULINGS

Courts Decide Damages Can Be Collected in Cases Of Infringements.

It is said more infringements on patents have been made in the radio field than in any other line of activity. Because of the crude construction of early sets, which embodied the same principles governing the construction of more elaborate radio sets, inventors were seldom protected on their original devices. It is possible, however, to recover an infringement as explained in the following cases.

In equity the rule for recovering for infringement of a patent is that where the net profits earned by reason of the infringement do not sufficiently compensate the owner of the patent for its infringement, there may, in a proper case, be awarded damages in addition to the ascertained net profits, and punitive damages may be awarded in the court's discretion, but ordinarily, the pecuniary gains arising from sales of an infringing article disclose the usefulness and commercial value of the thing invented, as well as its disadvantages, and may well constitute a guide to the true measure of damages. (Phila. Rubber Works Co. vs. U. S. Rubber Co., 275 F. 200.)

It is a well-established principle of law that the issuance of a later patent is, prima facie, a presumption of a patentable difference between it and an earlier patent, as laid down in a number of decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States, for example, in Miller vs. Earle Mfg. Co. (151 U. S. 186). Relying on this decision and others, the United States Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of Rubber Works Co. vs. U. S. Rubber Co., 275 F. 200, again expressed the rule that the issuance of a later patent raises a presumption that the invention claimed is different from that of an earlier patent, and the burden of proof rests upon the complainant, to establish infringement. It must nevertheless be remembered that despite this presumption it is quite possible for a patent to be infringed by a machine or an article which itself may be covered by one or more perfectly valid, later patents, and the question involved is not one of actual infringement, but merely of the burden of proof of such infringement.



- WIRELESS PHONE CARRIES 500 MILES**  
NEW YORK, July 4.—Oscar Schmidt, captain of the Scandinavian-American liner United States, believes his ship established a record for wireless telephony at sea on its voyage from Copenhagen. The United States picked up the Frederick VIII 500 miles away at sea, and carried on conversation for 32 minutes. The latter vessel, having no telephone, carried on its part of the conversation by the usual radio method. According to Captain Schmidt, the United States was in radio communication with Copenhagen almost until the vessel reached the coast of this country when land stations interrupted.

**HURLEY RESIGNS AS EMPLOYEES' HEAD**
