Randle Highlands Baptist
Changes Name Thursday
Announcement has been made of the formal rededication exercises of the Randle Highlands Baptist Church, to be held on the evening of Thursday, November 2. This congregation, which is the only religious body in that community, is known as the Randle Highlands Community Church, and was organized about fourteen years ago through the instrumentality of the late David C. Fountain in conjunction with several of the prominent Baptist pastors and laymen of East Washington under the name of the Minnesota Avenue Baptist Mission. Two years later the original brick edifice was erected on the present site purchased by the congregation at Naylor road and Q street southeast, and the name Randle Highlands Baptist Church was adopted.
Since that time the permanent success of that work has become thoroughly established, and the structure has proven inadequate to the needs of the field. Within the last few months extensive improvements have been added to the building, not only providing extra conveniences and facilities for carrying on the religious and social work of the community, but greatly enhancing the comfort and dignity of the edifice. The alterations on the front of the building consist of a broad tower, with entrance to the house of worship by large double doors on the street level. Double banistered stairways lead upward into the main auditorium, while a separate stairway affords access to the basement rooms. Above the vestibule are two commodious, well-lighted Bible school classrooms, and surmounting these a large covered belfry, for which a bell has been presented by a member of the congregation. The rear part of the church has been enlarged by the addition of another classroom. The building has been further beautified by the installation of cathedral glass windows throughout, several of which have been provided as memorials for deceased members of the congregation.
In dedicating the reconstructed edifice the congregation will formally assume the new corporate name of the Fountain Memorial Baptist Church in honor of the founder, the late David C. Fountain. Appropriate services will be held on November 2. Addresses will be made by Dr. H. W. O. Millington, executive secretary of the Columbia Association of Baptist Churches; Dean William Allen Wilbur, of Columbia College; Pastor J. W. Many, of East Washington Heights Baptist Church, and Mr. Rex B. Duckett, who is an associate minister of the church and president of the board of trustees. The order of services will be in charge of the pastor, Dr. Hubert Bunyca. Music will be furnished by the chorus choir under the direction of Dr. B. T. Woodward.
The church is now entering the fourth year of the present pastoral care of Dr. Bunyca, this being his second pastorate on this field. The Fountain Memorial Baptist Church, which enjoys the distinction of being the only community church in the District of Columbia under Baptist auspices, will continue to carry out its broad policy of liberalism, according associate membership to any evangelical Christian, with all of the privileges of worshippers. Besides being active in the religious education of the children and adults of the suburbs and in the local propagation of evangelical truth, the congregation is engaged in many phases of home and foreign mission work and is supporting a native missionary in Africa.
Among the auxiliary organizations of the church are two missionary societies, a ladies' aid society, a Baptist Young People's Society, and a large graded Bible school. The building is also used as the meeting place of the Randle Highlands Citizens' Association, and is the community house for religious and allied activities of the suburb.
