LARGE CROWD TO SEE TURF CLASSIC AT LAUREL

'OLD BONES' LISTED TO FACE BARRIER IN RICH HANDICAP

Paragon 2d and Lucky Hour Also Will Figure Strongly in Wagers. BY FRANK HARTIG. Devotees of the "Sport of Kings" will witness the most talked-of race of the season today when the \$25,000 Washington Handicap, over a mile and a quarter will be run at Laurel Park.

One of the most interesting angles to the event is the possibility of Exterminator, generally known to the "raiders" as "Old Bones," surpassing Man O' War as the largest money winner in the history of the turf. If "Old Bones" wins, and many of the doers favor him, a new turf king will be crowned.

Paragon 2d a Chiel. The disqualification of Paragon 2d last Saturday was a big disappointment to his backers. The Sanford horse worked the mile and a quarter a few days ago in 2:08 1-5 with 120 pounds up, and when post time comes Paragon 2d will be well supported in the "iron men."

The New York delegation figure the race is "locked" for Lucky Hour and has accepted the issue and the race is as good as won. Lucky Hour is in fine shape and will be ready for the issue when the barrier is sprung.

The race is expected to draw the largest crowd that has ever journeyed to the Laurel Park course. Additional train service will be provided from both Washington and Baltimore and track officials have announced that additional parking space will be available for motorists.

He declared, however, that Blue Nose will meet the Mayflower in a match race off Nova Scotia any time within a month if Capt. Henry Larkin, skipper of the Boston schooner, desires to go there.

Dope Braces for Shock. The dope must brace for a number of shocks today. Last Saturday the count was 23 to 5 in the way of favorable results, with four ties. The big upsets were Columbia, Rutgers and Dartmouth. Syracuse lost her chance while hammering at Pittsburgh's goal, an intercepted pass, with an 85-yard run turning near-victory into far nearer defeat. Harvard was doped at one touchdown above Centre, and eliminating an early fumble on Centre's 4-yard line, these figures were about correct.

Both machines have a world of line and backfield power, but so far Syracuse hasn't struck its top stride. When it does, any team might as well look out.

Some Hard Ones. The strong Army team will bring a new wrinkle to the game, when Yale is much stronger entrenched than the Blue was against Iowa. Yale has a strong machine to stop, but we pick the Bulldog to give the other a good fight. Princeton has been moving steadily forward, with fine results up to date from a team that was shorn of so many veterans and so many stars. The Tiger will give Chicago a first-class battle, but the heavier attacking Maroon team figures to win by one or two touchdowns. But there will be no Western romp. Dartmouth always feeds Harvard the best she has, but Cambridge overhadows Hanover and the Crimson has too much power for the Green.

One of the Classiest. When Georgia Tech and Notre Dame meet there will be quite enough thrills to carry over the week end. The first inclination here was to pick Notre Dame. But Georgia Tech seems to be two touchdowns stronger at home than she is on the road, and Georgia Tech at home has been almost unbeatable. Both schools are in a good way. Tech breaks down before Rockne's bewildering passing game, the Southern team should pull through. The Navy and Penn are in for a fine scrap, but the Navy has too much line and backfield power, plus experience, for Penn to have any great chance of winning.

Penn has been coming along nicely, but the Navy looks to be one of the star machines of the year, with a big line and three or four fast, experienced backs.

Out West. In the conference whirl Michigan should beat Illinois in the big game of the day, in spite of severe Wolverine losses through the Ohio state contest, where Yost lost two of his best.

Illinois gave Iowa all the Hawkeyes could handle, and Iowa was much further along than she was against Yale.

Last Saturday we picked Minnesota to beat Northwestern 7 to 0, but a Northwestern back recovered a fumble, to run 100 yards for the tying touchdown, at 7 to 7. Minnesota has just as hard a game today against Ohio State, where a frank confession here must admit that the chances are almost exactly equal, but Minnesota is playing at home.

Up to date the dope standing is as follows: Correct selections, 64; incorrect selections, 12. And most of the upsets came from what seemed to be the easiest choices—namely Columbia to beat N. Y. U., Rutgers

Covers Wide Range, and Important Groups Advance.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—A substantial measure of recovery from the low points of yesterday was evident in the principal financial markets.
