

COOLIDGE LEAVES FOR CLEVELAND TONIGHT Vice President Will Make Address There—Miss Mellon Rejoins Father After Cuban Trip—Secy. Davis Will Soon Start East.

By EVELYN HUNT. VICE PRESIDENT COOLIDGE will leave tonight for Cleveland, where he will make an address tomorrow, returning at once to Washington.

The Secretary of the Treasury, A. W. Mellon, has been joined by his daughter, Miss Ailsa Mellon, who went to Cuba with W. P. G. Harding and his daughter, Miss Margaret Harding. Mr. and Miss Harding will be absent some time longer.

The Secretary of Labor and Mrs. James J. Davis, who have been visiting in California for several weeks, will start this week for their home in Moonshine, Ill., where they will spend Thanksgiving. They will return to their apartment at Wardman Park Hotel about December 4.
