

RUSSIA MADE POWERLESS AT PEACE PARLEY

Soviet Delegation Admitted, But Conditions Deprive Them of Real Influence

ISMET PLEADS IN VAIN

Angora Leader Ready to Renew Demand for Plebiscite in Western Thrace Country

LAUSANNE, Nov. 23.—Soviet Russia came into the Near East peace conference this afternoon, but not as a full participant. Despite strong efforts by Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, to get Russia a place at the round table, the delegation will have a voice only in discussion of the Turkish straits. The allies have decided already to internationalize the Dardanelles, so Russia will play only a perfunctory part. Control of these strategic waterways will be vested in a League of Nations commission. Russia cannot participate in this commission until she becomes a member of the league.

ENVOY ACCEPTS

M. Vorovsky, Soviet envoy to Italy, notified the allies his government had decided to accept the invitation and later he was introduced formally to the chiefs of the various delegations.

Ismet Pasha today set out to answer the allies' objections to his previous demands and at the same time renewed demand for a plebiscite in western Thrace.

He claimed the large Turkish population in Thrace justified Turkish rule. Ismet Pasha said that Turkey would consent to a plebiscite under allied supervision.

The Turkish envoy has little hope of success, because Britain, France, Italy, Jugoslavia, and Greece all are against his claims. He paid particular attention to objections by Eleutherios Venizelos, head of the Greek delegation, against the restoration of Turkish frontiers in Europe as in 1913.

General Weygand, chief of staff to Marshall Poch, heads the sub-commission of the committee on military affairs. He will not report until the sub-commission finishes its work.

Ismet Pasha is demanding all the bridge heads along the western bank of the Maritza river, if the Turks are not to get the territory lying west of the river.

BLACK SEA ZONE

A subcommittee was appointed to examine the proposal for a demilitarized zone from the Black Sea to the Aegean Sea along the eastern frontier of Thrace and the request of Bulgaria that she be given an outlet on the Aegean Sea with a "corridor" of land such as connects Poland with the port of Dantzig.

The conference in a day or so will give its full attention to the Turkish straits. The Turks suggest that there be neutrality on the waterways and a zone established to be policed by international forces. They claim they are entitled to maritime and commercial concessions because the straits up to the present have been regarded as Turkish property.

Lord Curzon, of England, is the only one of the big three to be present. Premier Poincare, of France, and Premier Mussolini, of Italy, have gone back home.

Mexico Again Protests Attacks Along Border

The Mexican government yesterday, through Charge d'affaires Manuel C. Tellez, filed another of a series of protests to the United States Government against attacks made upon Mexicans living in Texas border towns.

U. S. to Sit in Conference Over Rhineland Troops

The State Department yesterday accepted an invitation to a conference with the Allies in an effort to reach an adjustment for the cost of maintaining armies on the Rhine.

The bill of the United States to date totals \$231,224,000, with credits of about \$37,100,000, leaving a balance due of approximately \$254,000,000.

Elliott Wadsworth, assistant Secretary of the Treasury, was designated as the representative of the United States. The conference is to be held in Paris at a later date.

WANTS D.C. SCHOOLS MODELS FOR NATION

Chicago Superintendent Says Laboratory of Education Is Needed Here.

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—Peter A. Mortenson, superintendent of Chicago schools, came out yesterday for creation of a department of education as part of a model program offered by Congressman Stuart F. Reed of West Virginia.

The schools of the District should be made models for the United States, believes Congressman Reed. According to Superintendent Mortenson this program would be furthered by a secretary of education.

"The Capital of the United States is the logical place where a complete laboratory of schools should be established," said Mr. Mortenson.

"It has the advantage of being a cosmopolitan center; it has libraries, museum, parks, national courts and offices—all of which would become the equipment for scientific experiment and research in education. But we must make this reservation—we cannot divorce any school system from the government of the people which it serves."

"On the establishment of this 'laboratory,' scholars from all over the country would be drawn to this central point, and adopt those characteristics of the Washingtonian school system which could be adopted to local needs."

Maniacs and Guards Battle in Asylum

LIMA, Ohio, Nov. 23.—Critically ill patients, led by Herschell G. Dunn, convicted of the robbery of the Basinger and Dunn Jewelry Store here some years ago, fought a pitched battle with guards of Lima State Hospital on the northern outskirts of Lima here today.

A platoon of twenty-five attendants fought for more than half an hour with bare fists against thirty-six patients before the latter were finally subdued. Metal slugs, stripped from the laundry equipment, were used by the patients in the fray.

President Again Names Woman to be Diplomat

President Harding tried again yesterday to get a woman in the diplomatic service.

He sent to the Senate the name of Lucile Atcherson, of Columbus, O., to be second secretary of embassy. Miss Atcherson was nominated in the last session of Congress, but failed of confirmation.

Secretary of State Hughes and Sumner Wells, of the American diplomatic service, will be the delegates of the United States at the Central American conference which opens here on December 4, the State Department announced yesterday.

ASKS FOR OUTLINE OF DAUGHERTY CASE

Judiciary Committee Calls on Keller to File Bill of Charges.

MUST RESPOND BY DEC. 1

Friends Declare He Will Not Reveal Witnesses Until Trial Begins.

The House Judiciary Committee yesterday formally called upon Representative Keller, author of the resolution proposing impeachment of Attorney General Daugherty, to submit a bill of particulars in support of his charges.

Mr. Keller further is requested to "name the persons involved in each transaction, the time and place thereof, and witnesses by which such facts can be established, together with their names and places of residence."

This information is desired "as early as it may be convenient, and not later than December 1."

In a letter to Chairman Volstead Monday morning, Attorney General Daugherty asked that the specific charges against him be demanded and that the hearings be expedited.

The resolution was proposed by Representative Foster (Rep.) of Ohio. Democrats as well as Republicans voted for it, as follows:

Republicans—Volstead, Minnesota; Graham, Pennsylvania; Dyer, Missouri; Boies, Iowa; Christopherson, South Dakota; Goodykoontz, West Virginia; Hersey, Maine; Chandler, New York; Foster, Ohio; Michener, Michigan; and Hickey, Indiana.

Democrats—Summers, Texas; Montague, Virginia; Wise, Georgia; Tillman, Arkansas; and Dominick, South Carolina.

Keller declined to comment or to state whether he will comply. He will confer with those interested with him in the impeachment proceedings before making any announcement.

The American Federation of Labor, railway brotherhoods and representatives of farmers' organizations have been active in supporting the impeachment demand. A meeting of B. M. Jewell with the Federation's executive council was held here yesterday to consider evidence.

President Gompers has announced formally that the Chicago injunction obtained by Daugherty during the recent railroad strike and the appointment of William J. Burns, as chief of the Department of Justice bureau of investigation would constitute the principal acts to be complained of by the labor unions.

Girl Drug Addict Implores Police To Help Her Quit

Tells of Being Taught to Use 'Magic Needle' by 'Lovely Woman.'

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Only one girl drug addict in a thousand surrenders, the police say, and today that one came to Dr. Carleton Simon, special deputy police commissioner on narcotics, and asked for help.

Her story was pitiful. She told of being taught the narcotic habit by a well-dressed woman, a drug drummer. The police say scores of women are engaged in drug boosting, receiving a percentage on sales from drug vendors.

The girl who surrendered gave her name as "Catherine McDonald," and said the "lovely woman" she met taught her how to use a magic needle that enabled her to dance all night and go to her work at a factory fresh and alert the next morning. Within a week she was a confirmed drug addict and within three months had wasted all her savings—\$500—buying dope and had lost her job.

Rail Clerks and Station Hands Ask Pay Increase

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—Railway clerks, freight handlers and station employees—371,000 in number—today applied for an increase in wages. Application was made before the United States Railway Labor Board by E. H. Fitzgerald, president of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees.

The present average monthly wages of clerical and station forces are \$85.80 as against \$109.02 under the labor board decision of 1920, according to Fitzgerald.
