WHEREAS, an act was passed by the last Central Assembly of this State, by a vote of three-fifths of All the members thereof, a duly certified copy of which the follows:

AN ACT to amend the Constitution of the State of North

Carclina.

WHEREAS A large number of the people are disfranchis-

Carclina.

Whereas, A large number of the people are disfranchised by the freshold qualification now required of voters for members of the Senate. Therefore,

Szc. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Corolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, (three-fifths of the whole number of members of each House concurring.) That the 2nd clause of the 1st section of the 1st article of the amended Constitution, ratified by the people of North Carolina on the second Monday of November, in the year of Our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty-five, shall be amended to read as follows: Every free white man of the age of twenty-one years, being a native or natman of the age of twenty-one years, being a native or naturalized citizen of the United States, and who has been an inhabitant of the State for twelve months immediately preceding the day of any election, and shall have paid public taxes, shall be entitled to vote for a member of the Senate

for the district in which he resides.

SEC. 2. Be it further enacted, That the Governor of the State be, and he is hereby directed to issue his proclama-tion to the people of North Carolina, at least six months before the next election for members of the General Assembly, setting forth the purport of this act, and the amendment to the Constitution herein proposed, which amendment to the Constitution herein proposed, which proclamation shall be accompanied by a true and perfect copy of the act, authenticated by the certificate of the Secretary of State, and both the proclamation and the copy of this act, the Governor of the State shall cause to be published in ten newspapers of this State, at least six months before the election of members to the General Assembly.
