LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER CANADA. Advance in Breadstuffs. HALIFAX, October 6.—The Canada has arrived with six days later news from Europe.

Manchester market very dull. The Arctic left on her regular day, since which she has not been heard from.

Nothing from the Baltic fleet. Wallachia and Moldavia have been entirely evacuated by the Russians.

It is said that the peace proposals were drawn up by the Czar. The Crimea expedition had landed and were marching upon Sebastopol.

It is officially announced by the French and English Governments that the Crimea expedition of 58,000 troops had landed without opposition at Eupatoria.

The Russian fleet had again put into Sebastopol. Part of the allied fleet had arrived off that port.

It was stated at Constantinople, but not yet confirmed, that the Czar had assented to the proposed terms, and that a steamer had been dispatched to postpone the landing of the expedition.

Annapolis and Kerach are closely blockaded. The evacuation of Moldavia is complete. Greece makes submission to the Porte.

The reported rupture between Turkey and Persia is officially contradicted. It is decided that neither Swaborg nor Cronstadt shall be attacked this season.

The ministerial crisis in Belgium is over; the present ministers are to remain. ENGLAND.

American breadstuffs are generally firm, with an upward tendency. The brokers' circular reports an advance of 2s in flour, 4d in wheat and 1d in corn.

Five deaths have occurred on board the U. S. Frigate San Jacinto, lying at Southampton. The propeller steamship Petrel put back into the Clyde, having been damaged in a gale.

The allied powers have decided not to attack Sebastopol this winter. The French Baltic fleet returns to France.

A Navy Officer Resigned.—We hear that Lieut. J. D. Bulloch, U. S. N., has resigned. Not long since it was said in naval circles here that this officer had been ordered to the John Adams.
