ON the petition of BENJ. TATMAN, of New York,  
and GEO. N. TAYLOR, of Philadelphia, pray-  
ing for the extension of a patent granted to them  
on the 11th day of October, 1841, for an improve-  
ment in machinery for making pipes of iron,  
lead, tin, and other metallic substances, for seven  
years from the expiration of said patent, their
