WASHINGTON, March 26, 1857. MY DEAR SIR: I have, at your request, reconsidered my determination, as announced to you, declining your tender of the office of Governor of the Territory of Kansas.

I understand that you, and all your Cabinet, cordially concur in the opinion expressed by me, that the actual, bona fide residents of the Territory of Kansas, by a fair and regular vote, unaffected by fraud or violence, must be permitted in adopting their State constitution, to decide for themselves what shall be their social institutions.

We need hardly add that such language from the Enquirer at this time justifies and substantiates the position with reference to the Kansas controversy, maintained throughout the late Presidential canvass by the orators on the stump, in behalf of the Democratic party, throughout the non-slaveholding States.

The Military Department of the Pacific.—Official advices from this department have been received in Washington up to the 4th of March, inst.
