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REBELS REPAID WITH GREAT LOSS.

Further Particulars of Wednesday's Battle—Four Desperate Assaults of the Enemy Repulsed with Great Loss—Rebel General Forrest Killed—107 Confederate Soldiers Killed.

Another Great Battle Expected. NASHVILLE, Dec. 1.—The Federal forces under General Thomas retired from Franklin last night, and have taken a position on the line of battle south of Nashville about three miles.

Details of the Conflict. NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—A special dispatch to the Herald, dated Nashville, December 1, 1864, says that about noon Wednesday a small army reached Franklin, when Gen. Schofield prepared to give battle.
