THE GREAT CONSPIRACY.

THE TRIAL.

Proceedings To-Day.

At ten o'clock this morning the prisoners were brought into Court and were placed in the same relative positions occupied by them yesterday.

Arnold, as usual, heads the line as they enter the room and file along the long, narrow walk of the dock. Thus he occupies the desirable seat at the end of the bench near the open (or grates) window. The fact that the evidence thus far has borne on him less heavily than on most of his fellows seems to give him confidence, and he occupies much of his time gazing out the window or in stubbling a newly turned out mustache with his left hand. Mudd wears a white handkerchief loosely about his neck, as if to protect his throat from any possible draught. The other prisoners either think their throats hardly worth saving, or in instinctive dread of any suggestion of pressure thereon go collarless and cravatless.

Mrs. Surratt, with the exception of a period spent in conversation with her counsel, Mr. Aiken, rests her head in her hands, with eyes closed, and seems to suffer from the heat, fanning herself with a newspaper. O'Laughlin, dressed in deep black, cushions his manacled hands upon a silk handkerchief, placed upon his knee. His name was involved in much of the evidence yesterday, it will be remembered. It has been stated that he voluntarily surrendered himself to the authorities after the assassination, but this is a mistake. He was arrested on Hillen street, Baltimore, by Detective W. E. Wallis, of Marshal Garretts force, who delivered him to the authorities here.

O'Laughlin is the son of a worthy blacksmith of Baltimore, who is stated to be a staunch Union man. O'Laughlin and two of his brothers have been in the rebel army, from which Michael returned about six months ago, but he never reported to the authorities or took the oath of allegiance, so far as is known. The other members of the family are said to have been hard-working people; but Michael, who was extremely fond of dress, would work not more than three days per week, and sinking the shop in the intervals, was in the habit of spending his time promiscuously the streets, clad in his best.

Arnold (whose full name is Samuel A. Arnold) is the son of the baker Arnold, who keeps now, or formerly kept an establishment at the corner of Liberty and Fayette streets, Baltimore. The father has been known as a pronounced Union man. Young Arnold (the prisoner) was in the rebel army but returned home and took the oath of allegiance.

Among the visitors in the Court room yesterday were Bishop Simpson, of the Methodist Church, with several other Ministers, Bishop McIlvaine, of the Episcopal Church, Brigadier General Ewing and Major Hay, Mr. Lincoln's Secretary.

This morning Hon. Solomon Foots, of Vermont, and Judge Watts, of New Mexico, Hon. Ben Wade, of Ohio, Colonel Markland of the Post Office Department, were among those present.

A registry is made at the door each day of all persons admitted on passes.

Opening of the Court. After the prisoners had been placed in the dock, the Court was called to order by Major General Hunter, all the members answering to their names. The reading of yesterday's proceedings were then entered upon by Mr. Murphy, but were suspended by the Court to afford one of the prisoners (Herold) an opportunity to leave the room temporarily. On his return the reading was again proceed with.

RESIGNATION ACCEPTED. In consequence of the painful circumstances attending the family of Secretary Seward, and the necessity for the active aid of what remains of his household, the Secretary of War has accepted the resignation of Gen. W. H. Seward, son of the Secretary of State.

THE VETERAN RESERVE CORPS. General Orders No. 15, just promulgated from the War Department, shows that since June, 1864, 116 officers of the Veteran Reserve Corps have resigned; 37 have been dismissed since August, 1863; 3 have been discharged since March, 1864; and 4 have died. Eleven appointees have been revoked since July, 1861; 107 have been cancelled since August, 1861; 12 officers declined appointments, and one vacated his position.

SUPPLIES FOR THE ARMIES. Large amounts of supplies for Sherman's army and the Army of the Potomac are now arriving here daily. All vessels despatched from Northern ports for City Point with stores have received orders to proceed to Washington.

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL. Lieut. Col. Walker, Assistant Adjutant General on Gen. Hancock's staff, having resigned, Major E. B. Parsons has been announced as Assistant Adjutant General at the headquarters of the Middle Military Division.

THE PROVOST MARSHAL'S OFFICE. Col. Ingraham, provost marshal general of the defenses north of the Potomac, has removed his office from 14th street to the new buildings on Pennsylvania avenue, between 15th and 15 1/2 streets, adjoining Gen. Augur's headquarters.

RELIEVED. Capt. Slipper has been relieved from duty as pass officer at Gen. Augur's headquarters, and assigned to Gen. Bartlett's staff as Assistant Adjutant General.

SIGNAL OFFICER. Lieut. Paul Brodie, Signal Corps U. S. A., has been announced as chief signal officer of the Department of Washington by Major Gen. Augur.

REASSIGNED. Assistant Surgeon D. P. Miller has been relieved from duty on the hospital steamer State of Maine, and assigned to Columbia College Hospital.

General Grant has ordered the several corps commanders to recommend meritorious officers in their commands for promotion in the regular army.

THE SHOE BUSINESS.—The Lynn (Mass.) Bulletin says shoe buyers are numerous, and orders are coming in faster than they can be filled. The stock of goods on hand is very light, and there is no prospect of present or an accumulation.

About three hundred recruits were mustered out of the United service at Boston on Monday. The Transcript says that about 1,000 more were to be mustered out on Tuesday.

There is a war between the employers and employees of the Fall Brook and Morris Run coal mines. The refractory miners have camped out on the lands of the companies, and refuse to permit other miners to be employed.

This year the French Camp of Instruction will be formed at Orleans, between the 16th of May and the 1st of June, under the command of Major Gen. Vial.

The Chinese Government have been informed by the Russian ambassador that the Russian portion of the telegraph to Peking will be completed by the 1st of January, 1865.

Henry A. Wise now claims to have been a prominent Union man, and only took up arms when forced to do so by the North to protect Southern rights. This certainly caps the climax of rebel impudence.

The status of Senator Benton, which was ordered six years ago by the citizens of Missouri, has been revived, and he is now in that city on the 12th instant. It is of bronze, ten feet high and was cast at the royal foundry in Munich.

The Arkansas Legislature has finally adopted a Constitutional Amendment. A meeting was passed unanimously. The House is busy about a bill disfranchising all who hold positions in the rebel army.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GOVERNOR VANCE (N. C.) CAPTURED. NEW YORK, May 17.—The Herald's correspondent mentions the arrest of Gov. Vance, by Kilpatrick's cavalry, on Friday last. He is to be tried at Washington.

KENTUCKY LEGISLATURE. Trial of Chief Justice Bullitt. CINCINNATI, May 17.—The Commercial's Frankfort special dispatch says: The Kentucky Legislature assembled yesterday, but no quorum was present. The special business of the session is to try Chief Justice Bullitt on the charge of conspiracy to overthrow the Government.

It is reported Bullitt has resigned in order to escape trial.

FROM HAVANA. The Rebel RAN Stenwall. NEW YORK, May 17.—The steamer Nightingale brings the latest dates to the 11th, and Key West on the 13th.

The rebel RAN Stenwall arrived at Havana on the 11th. It was said the Government would not be allowed to discharge or take on board any men or ammunition, and only sufficient coal to take her to sea, and that if the Captain General orders to that effect he would willingly. No report of her having destroyed any vessels on her way to Havana was reported.

The blockade running steamer Imogene arrived at Matanzas on the 10th inst., with 1,000 bales of cotton and 100 tons of sugar, and 12 passengers en route to Europe. The Imogene sailed on the 11th, ostensibly for Nassau. Her passengers reached Havana on the 11th.

It is said our Consul applied officially to the Spanish Consul at Havana for the presence of the Stenwall to Key West, but Gen. De Marina refused the request.

The steamer Columbia was then sent. As she sailed the Fort's coast signal fires were seen along for 30 miles.

On the 7th a steamer was signalled, and suddenly under all steam started northward, discharging the English ensign, and the flag of the rebel flag at the fore. She was thought to be the Imogene.

Financial. [From the N. Y. Commercial, May 16.] Gold is steady at about yesterday's quotations. The speculative operations are merely nominal.

The money market shows a complete recovery of the late panic. The large disbursements of the Treasury compensate for the extraordinary subscriptions to the Seven-thirty loan. The amount of funds in the hands of money brokers is unusually large, and large sums are held by them, which it is found impossible to lend for street purposes. The general rate on call is 5 per cent., with exceptions at both 4 and 6 per cent. The demand for commercial paper is active, but the supply nearly nominal. The rates of discount range from 5 1/2 per cent. to 6 per cent. The demand for exchanges for to-morrow's steamer is moderately active. The leading drafts are asking 110 for sixty days' sterling, and the continued scarcity of commercial bids enables them to realize that rate.

Governments are quiet. There is a partial lull in the excitement of the Seven-thirty loan. The disposition to sell and cash interest bonds is less apparent than yesterday. Those most familiar with the condition of the European market, express confidence that prices there for five months will advance materially, and predict fresh returns from London and Frankfurt.

The New York Post says: It is rumored that the Secretary of the Treasury is about to make considerable drafts on the national banks, and as these institutions hold a large amount of Government funds, there is some foundation for the statements made.

For the unpaid requisitions of contractors, the necessary payments to the army, and the claims of railroad companies and other creditors of the National Treasury are pressing, and the necessity for their liquidation is paramount.

But we are assured on competent authority that these payments will be so widely distributed, and the drafts so carefully calculated, as to adjust that the money market shall be little if at all disturbed.
